Not being able to compete during the year of his arrival at Oregon because of NCAA eligibility rules, Lile used the time for two shoulder surgeries. When he made his debut for the Ducks this year at the Oregon Preview, he was more than ready as he launched his best throw of the year, 219-6.

"That first meet came up and I was so nervous I could hardly stand on the runway," Lile said.

While Lile came to Oregon as a proven javelin competitor, Van Hee had to show his coaches that he belonged in the same class as his teammate. Coming out of Gresham High School, placing only sixth in his senior state competition with a throw of 175-6, Van Hee quickly burst onto the collegiate scene and showed major improvements.

For the first time in his career, Van Hee surpassed the 200-foot mark at the Hayward Triangular (200-5). Then the following week, he eclipsed his PR with a throw of 202-4 in the Oregon Twilight. And by the time last year's Pac-10 Championships rolled around, the impression he had made on head coach Bill Dellinger moved him onto the championship squad.

At the championships he did not disappoint anyone. Van Hee improved his PR by an outstanding 13 feet, to 215-6, placing fifth in the Pac-10.

Despite a constant bout with a sore arm, Van Hee has continued his success this year. Although he has not improved on his PR he set last May, his throws have been consistently in the 210 to 215 range.

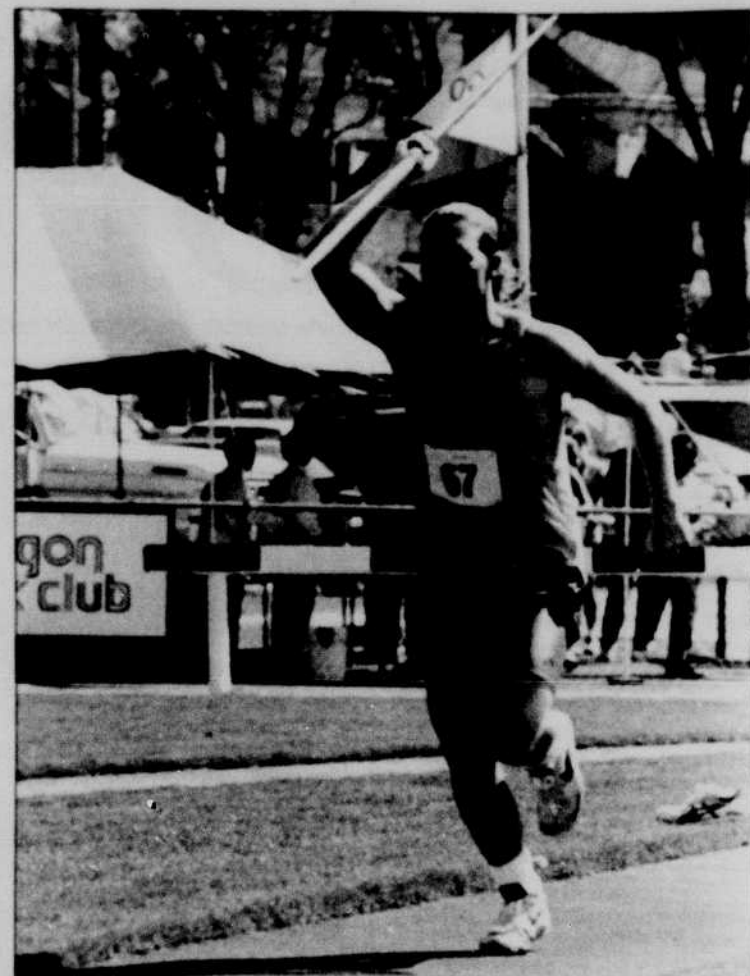
With the regular season concluded, this year's Pac-10 Championships mark one of the last chances for the athletes to show their stuff.

"I'm very excited about this weekend," Lile said. "The Pac-10 (meet) is the fullest in throwers that it has ever been, and myself being only two feet away from a provisional mark to go to the nationals, I want to make the best of this year. I don't want to wait until next year."

For Van Hee the goal is no different.

"I want to make the finals to score a point," Van Hee said. "To place high in the Pac-10 [Championships] this year would be a real honor."

No matter what the outcome is this weekend, the Oregon track and field team is assured of having two great competitors back for their junior and senior seasons next year.

Head start promises to pay off for men

After two straight years of placing below second place at the Pacific-10 Championships, the men's track and field team is in position to bring a little bit of championship glory back to Hayward Field. And then some.

Going into today's conference meet in Tucson, Ariz., the team has a 24-point head start on the hunt for the conference title, thanks to the Oregon decathletes' 1-2-3 finish at last weekend's Pac-10 Multi-Events.

"One of the nice things about going into this meet is we did get the points that we needed to get and could have gotten in the decathlon," head coach Bill Dellinger said. "Those are already in the bank."

While those points will play a big role in the Ducks quest for an eighth conference crown, perhaps the biggest factor in the team's performance will be its depth.

"I'll tell you what I like about this team," Dellinger said. "We go to the Pac-10 Championships with at least one person in every event. There are very few teams there that will cover all of the events."

And the Ducks cover the field well, to boot.

Their sprinting corps is one of their strongest areas, mainly because freshman Pat Johnson has taken the Conference — and the nation, for that matter — by storm, earning automatic NCAA qualifications in the 200-meter and 400-meter dashes.

And when you add senior Dino Philyaw, junior LaMont Woods and junior Dewayne Ingram, not only are the individual sprint races covered, but so

is the 4x100 relay.

The Ducks' young distance runners — particularly juniors Karl Keska and Scott Nicholas in the 1,500-meter race and freshman Matt Davis in the 5,000-meter race — round out the team's stacked running events.

The Ducks will also get strong individual performances from their decathlete contingent of junior Ray Livingston, senior Kanon Vanderhoff and the top decathlete in the conference in junior Jeremy Williams.

While Williams will compete in the pole vault and Vanderhoff will probably compete in the long jump, Livingston is slated for the vault, the long jump and the 110 high hurdles.

Sophomore Chris Nelson has good momentum for the Pac-10 meet after finally clearing 7-1 in the high jump last weekend at the Oregon Twilight. Nelson cleared a PR 7-2 1/4 last weekend, good for NCAA provisional marks.

The Ducks also cover the throwing events well, as Sophomore Dusty Carlson and senior Dan Zorich promise to provide strong performances in the shot put, hammer and discus and junior Jim Lile and sophomore Todd Van Hee will be out to capture the javelin title.

That depth, Dellinger said, puts the Ducks in far better position than they have been in in recent years.

"The last couple of years we have been going to the meet just hoping that we wouldn't be at the bottom, and we are going down to this meet with what I think is a legitimate shot to win it," Dellinger said.
