

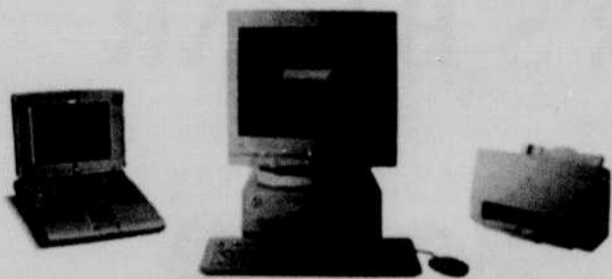

realizes there are large numbers of us and we can't be spotted on the street," Anderson said. "We don't fit into stereotypical pigeonholes. [Queerfest will show] that we can come out here and have fun," she said.

Vendors at the event included Mother Kali's Books, the MPowerment Project and Hungry Head Books.

The music and entertainment of Queerfest are part of sharing homosexual and bisexual culture, said Stephanie Carnahan, coordinator of education and sports services for the University Dean of Students office.

"A lot of people don't think of lesbians, gays and bisexuals as having a culture," Carnahan said.

Pride Week is about "promoting visibility, combating homophobia and establishing a sense of pride," she said.

Gay Pride Week activities began last Friday and will continue through this weekend.

An exhibit in the Multicultural Center features highlights of lesbian history and will be on display through this week.

A Queer Pride Week dance will take place Saturday in the Carson dining hall beginning at

9 p.m. and the University Pocket Playhouse is performing "The Well of Horniness," a comedy about queer issues. The play begins at 5 p.m. on Friday and

The district attorney's office will usually seek incarceration only if it thinks the case can be won, and success is rare without cooperation from the victim, Warnisher said.

"The system cannot protect a survivor," said Eugene police Lt. Vic Mann. "It only works if the survivor works with the system."

Warnisher recommends that victims file restraining orders against their abusers immediately after an arrest.

"The restraining order is a very effective tool," he said. "[It] may prevent abuse."

A restraining order prevents the abuser from entering the victim's home, school and place of business. It can also award the victim temporary custody of the couple's children, said Karla Headley, a legal aid at the Lane County Courthouse who helps

victims file restraining orders.

A restraining order can be filed if abuse occurred in the previous six months. The respondent must be at least 18 years old, she said.

Anyone wanting to file a restraining order should arrive at the Lane County Courthouse between 8:45 and 9 a.m. to fill out the necessary paper work in time for the 10 a.m. hearing, Headley said.

Women seeking to escape their batterers can also get help from Womenspace, a nonprofit organization that provides shelter for battered women seeking to escape their abusers.

Womenspace assists women survivors as they adjust to life without their abusers, said Jennifer Beach, assistant director of community outreach for Womenspace.

Women may stay in the organization's emergency shelter for up to one month after leaving their abusers. This gives them a

chance to find housing and other necessities in a safe environment, she said.

Womenspace also refers abused women to organizations that can help them create a new life by providing counseling, food and rent assistance, Beach said.

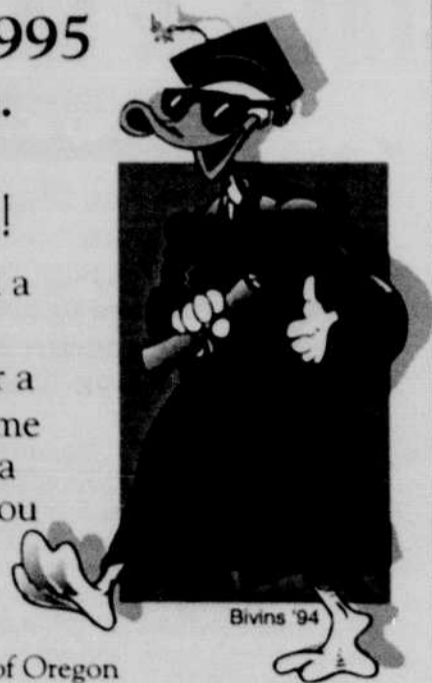
