**'Europe On the Loose' provides honest advice for summer travelers**

Europe is a popular destination for college graduates and college students. And most of those travelers will need help deciding where to go, how to stick to a tight budget and how feel like they fit in.

Well, The Berkeley Guides' *Europe On the Loose 1995* is sure to provide help and answers to those questions.

Following a system that began with Harvard's *Let's Go* travel book series, the Berkeley Guides series is revamping the standards by providing yearly editions of its books. Student travelers from the University of California-Berkeley go beyond the familiar tourist sights and point out places, people and events that the average traveler never gets to see.

Scott McNeely, executive editor of The Berkeley Guides, said the Berkeley series strives to appeal to a diverse group of students.

"We like to emphasize outdoor things like hiking, biking and canoeing," McNeely said. Some



people may not be interested in that, but "it's important to include," he said.

When McNeely was a student at Berkeley, he wrote a chapter in one of the series' first books, *The Berkeley Guide to Eastern Europe*. He believes the series is strongly attached to students' needs and expectations.

"We're part of student life," he said.

For each country, student travelers from University of California-Berkeley provide a voice of experience on the basics: money, transportation, accommodations, food, language, mail, phones and emergencies. The student researchers also provide a realistic estimate of how much it will cost to spend a day in a country.

The student travel writers aren't afraid to tell it like it is, either. One writer gives tips about traveling in Denmark.

"Fail-safe ways to make Danish friends: offer a beer, criticize the Swedes, compliment the Danish Soccer League, offer

another beer."

And in Romania: If a slimy waiter rips you off, smile, make some wild hand gestures, spit on the floor and leave. You'll only be out a few dollars, and they'll think you have Romanian blood."

Finland caught its reviewers praises: "Though the reserved Finns won't embrace you, Finland will: It wraps you in overwhelming birch forests that push into the city borders, and then releases you into a jigsaw-puzzle landscape of more than 18,000 lakes."

*Europe On the Loose* provides detailed maps of major cities and each country. It also lists places to sleep, places worth seeing and what to do "after dark." It is as comprehensive as it can be in the space it has.

McNeely recommends that if you are planning on traveling to a specific region or country in Europe, to use a more specialized book. The Berkeley Guides has books on France, Ireland, Eastern Europe and others.

*Europe On the Loose 1995* is 921 pages with 112 pages of maps. It costs \$18.95. Berkeley Guides are available at bookstores or by calling 1-800-533-6478.

resume.

Especially if you are sending your resume to some kind of job bank or resume database, you should write your resume to contain keywords and industry acronyms that describe your skills.

Employers search these databases for keywords that fit the requirements of the job opening. For example, instead of writing "Worked on the development and production of 65432A chip," use keywords: "VLSI design and bipolar CMOS fab of 65432A microprocessor."

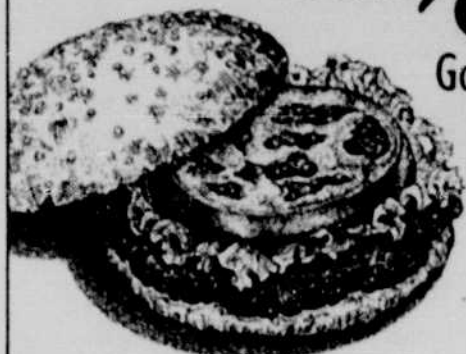
