

Serbs free final hostages amid continued shelling

SARAJEVO, Bosnia-Herzegovina (AP) — As Bosnian Serbs freed the last of the peacekeepers they had taken hostage, U.N. soldiers abandoned nine posts around Sarajevo, saying conditions had become too dangerous for them to stay.

Even as the peacekeepers withdrew, a shell smashed into a crowd lined up for water in a government-held suburb Sunday, killing seven people and wounding 12.

Sunday's withdrawal means Serb and government heavy weapons around Sarajevo are no longer under U.N. supervision. The big guns had been placed in collection depots last year under the threat of NATO airstrikes meant to end Serb mortar attacks on the besieged city.

However, both sides in recent days have raided the depots to reclaim weapons as heavy fighting erupted again.

The Serbs announced the release of the last 26 peacekeepers after four Serbs were freed from U.N. detention in Sarajevo, as the rebels had demanded. The Serbs took more than 370 peacekeepers hostage last month in retaliation for

NATO airstrikes.

In return for releasing the U.N. hostages, a senior Bosnian Serb official, Nikola Koljevic, said the Serbs also had been assured there would be no more airstrikes. But U.N. officials refuted the claim.

"The duties performed by the U.N. in Bosnia and in the capital Sarajevo have shrunk," acknowledged U.N. spokesman Alexander Ivanko. He insisted, however, that "airstrikes remain an option."

But they seemed unlikely. A senior U.N. official said there was "no chance" that NATO airstrikes would be called in as punishment for Sunday's fatal shelling.

It was the shelling of a Serb market in February 1994, killing 68 people, that prompted the Western allies to threaten airstrikes unless the Serbs turned their heavy weapons around Sarajevo over to U.N. control.

But the United Nations has been rendered ever more helpless around Sarajevo since the hostages were taken, opting not to use force against the Serbs.

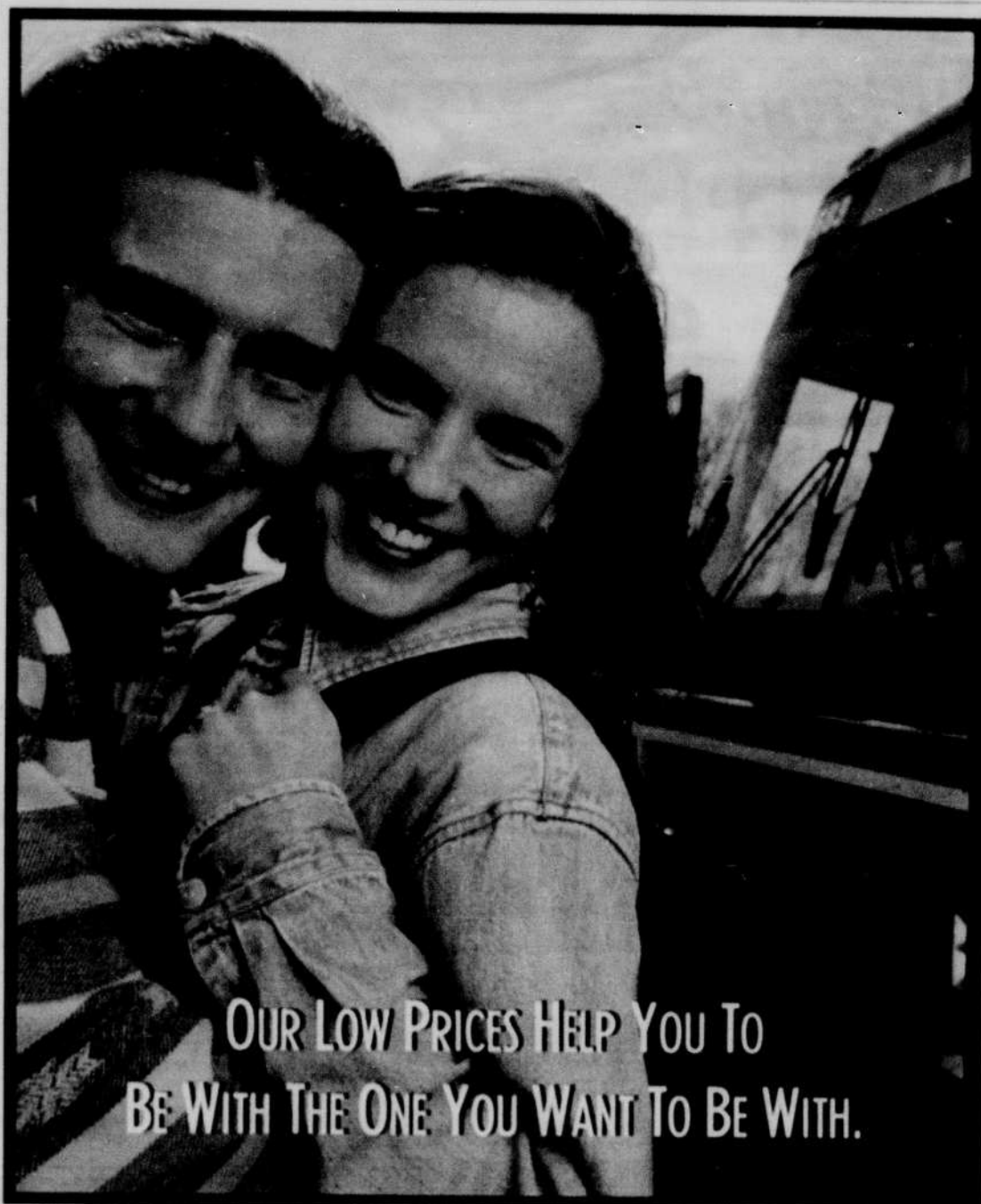
Internet Classes: SUMMER TERM
