## Will family planning lose funding?

Title X, the federal program for family planning services, is cut by a House committee

Family planning agencies across the United States are in jeopardy of losing as much as \$193 million in federal support, under a bill being considered in the House of Representatives.

Title X, the only federal program dedicated solely to funding family planning and related reproductive health care services, has been eliminated from the current version of the Labor, Health, Human Services and Education appropriations bill.

The current language of the bill — which is set to be considered on the floor of the House on Wednesday — would eliminate Title X and transfer 60 percent of the money to the Maternal Child Health Block Grant and 40 percent to community health centers.

The block grant specifies for some of the monies to be allocated to services other than family planning.

Title X provided the only federal monies specifically earmarked for family planning, said Gerry Odisio, health policy specialist for the Oregon Department of Human Resources.

Under the block grant rules, about 30 percent of the funds

belong to children with special needs, another 30 percent belongs to pregnant women and 10 percent belongs to administrative costs, Odisio said. The leftover money would go to unspecified categories, which might, but might not, include family planning.

Recipients of Title X funds include: university medical centers, community action organi-

THE HISTORY

■ 1970 Title X of the Public Health Service Act was enacted, creating for the first time a comprehensive federal program devoted entirely to the provision of family planning services on a national basis.

■ July 20, 1995 The House Appropriations Committee voted to eliminate Title X funding and transfer the money to other programs without earmarking it for family planning.

■ July 24 The House Appropriations Committee passed the Labor, Health, Human Services and Education appropriations bill 26-15 — without Title X.

■ July 31 The Rules Committee will decide if it will allow a discussion and vote on Title X on the House floor without subjecting it to amendments.

■ Aug. 2 or 3 The Labor, Health, Human Services and Education appropriations bill is scheduled for a House vote.

The director of the Office of Public Safety will leave the University to take over as police chief at Florida State University's police department in September.

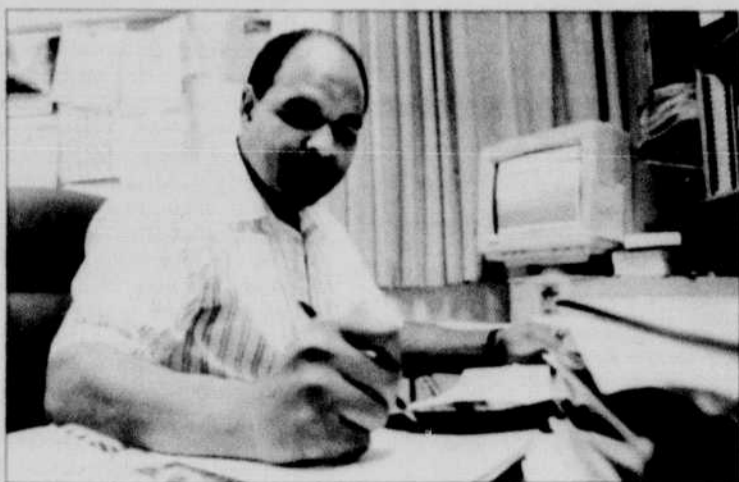
Carey Drayton, who accepted the job two weeks ago, begins
