OREGON VS STANFORD

Head coaches respect each other, ready for battle

■ **GAME PREVIEW:** Two first-year head coaches will try to stay unbeaten this Saturday

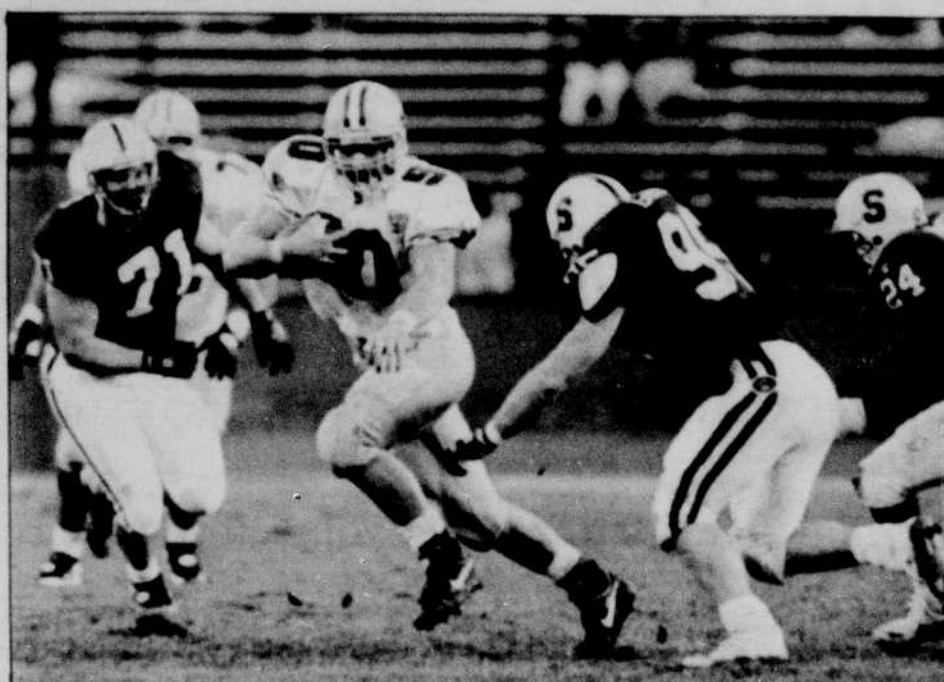
The undefeated Ducks return to Autzen Stadium Saturday to face another unbeaten team in Stanford, hoping to continue their winning ways and their first-place hold on the Pacific-10 Conference.

With only three games gone by, Oregon has been turned into one of the favorites to win the division crown for the second-consecutive season by the media, but head coach Mike Bellotti wants everybody to know that it's not going to be as easy as people think.

"We can't live with just one step toward the Pac-10 Championship," said Bellotti. "Every game in this conference is a struggle and you have to be ready to play your best football game."

With that in mind, the Ducks have been preparing for the Cardinal, who have shocked many football writers with a 2-0-1 start to the season.

Stanford started its 1995 campaign in the same fashion as Oregon, in regards to a new coaching staff. At the end of last season, famed head coach Bill

Walsh stepped down from his position to return to the surroundings of NFL camps, relinquishing his duties to first-year head coach Tyrone Willingham.

Willingham, who holds 17 years of coaching experience at the college — he was an assistant at Stanford from 1989 to 1991 — and professional levels, is the

first Cardinal head coach to begin his Stanford coaching career with two consecutive wins since 1980, and only the fifth to accomplish the feat in the last 55 years.

"Coach Willingham has done a great job, he took over a program in less shape than I did," said Bellotti. "They're playing good football and they've played good football teams. Stanford is a very good football team."

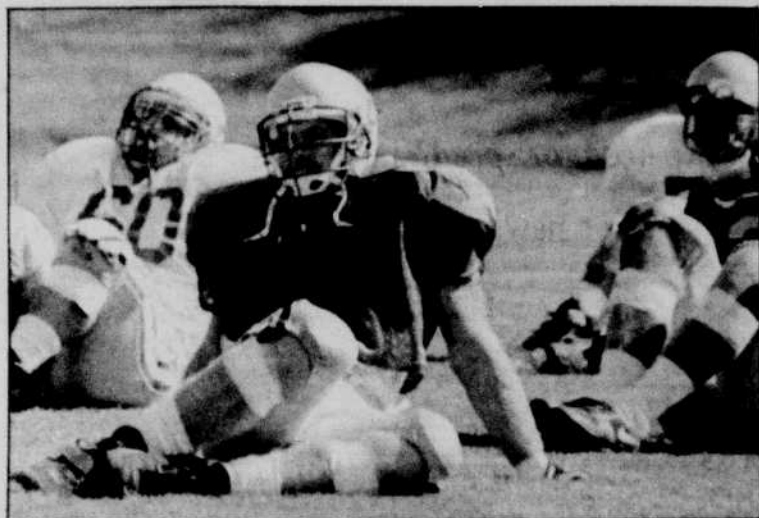
Over the years Stanford's strong point has been offense, and this year looks to be no different as the team has averaged 33.6 points a game. However, Bellotti feels his team needs to be more prepared for the Cardinal defense.

"One of the best things about their program is the defense," said Bellotti. "Their much more aggressive than in the past, and the two inside linebackers (Chris Draft and Mike Hall) are their toughest defensive players."

On the other side of the coin, Willingham couldn't find anything bad to say about the Ducks either.

"We don't assume (the Ducks) are a tough team, we know they're a tough team," said Willingham. "Everything about Oregon is striking and bothersome. They won the Pac-10 and we just hope we're ready."

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high 15 for 81 yards in losses. Only safeties Jeff Sherman and Chad Cota and inside linebacker Jeremy Asher played more defensive downs than Bailey.

Bailey started his football career as a sophomore in high school, but prior to playing on the gridiron he was a competitor on the soccer field.

"Being a big guy and kind of fat as a young kid everybody pushes you into football as your sport," said the 6-foot-3, 276 pound Bailey. "Before I started football I was a big soccer player. I liked that a lot more."

Although he loved soccer, football seemed to be the sport most suited for him. Bailey played for one of the nation's most successful high school programs and one the state's best defenses in Hawaii. He earned first-team honors on the Honolulu all-Interscholastic League and notched second-team all-state recognition.

This season being his final go around, Bailey wants nothing less than a second trip to Pasadena. However, before that can happen he knows that he and his teammates have to take one game at a time if they plan to return to the Rose Bowl.

"We've got a long way to go before we can start thinking about that," said Bailey. "It's great that the fans and the media can be thinking about it, but we've got to worry about going 4-0, 5-0 and so on. If we were to start thinking about stuff like that we'd go 3-8 or 4-8."

Whatever the outcome winds up being for this season, Bailey has modest and simple plans for his life.

"I'd like to have a job and a family some day," Bailey said and then added, "no different than another guy. I'm looking forward to it. It's been fun playing football but when it's over I'm ready."

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
