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became concerned about the youth loitering in the Eugene mall so they decided to work with the New Roads Program to try to get kids off the street and back into school, Piercy said.

The community has been getting involved by giving donations of books, equipment and supplies to the homeless school. The New Roads Program is asking for volunteers for the homeless school, for street outreach workers and for youth advocates. A training

Speech: University receives goals for new year

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that the University is a part of Oregon as a whole.

“In appearances around the state this year, I have expressed repeatedly my conviction that this is not the great university of somewhere, but the University of Oregon,” he said.

Frohnmayr touched on two concerns that have caused problems at California colleges and universities, but have not been an issue at this University. The University, Frohnmayr said, has a continuing obligation to have a diverse population of students and faculty. As a result, it has not been involved in “battles of race-related policies.”

Frohnmayr also said the University’s long-standing policy to not tolerate any form of sexual harassment has prevented conflicts.

“Policies to that effect ... will be implemented this year that further advance our commitment that

no one is to be demeaned, degraded or injured by the careless or calculated action of another person,” Frohnmayr said.

He also presented new goals for the University for the coming year. Frohnmayr said he wants the University to:

- Strive to give students and education that ranks among the best in the nation.
- Emphasize the University’s role not only as an important factor in the state’s economy, but also as an “engine of wealth creation.”
- Connect the University and society together through ongoing community service.

“We are at an extraordinary place in an extraordinary time,” Frohnmayr said. “I would not trade my place amidst you for any that I currently can imagine.”

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
