On the same day that the Mariners and Angels finished the regular season at a deadlock, the third-year expansion team Colorado Rockies captured its first playoff berth — the fastest of any expansion team in history. As very well it should have been, the Rockies won their invitation to the playoffs in a slugfest at Coors Field in the mile-high air of Denver, 10-9 over the San Francisco Giants.
