Clean up: Project helps students get involved

"It is wonderful to see students and the community come together to make a difference," he said.

Students said the event was a great way for them to become involved in cleaning up the environment. "It's something that everybody can do and it really makes a difference," said Rebecca Graham, a University sophomore majoring in anthropology.

Before Saturday's clean up, restoration efforts had lacked student involvement, said David Wagner, a scientist who has been working to restore the park since 1977. He said student involvement is important because restoring nature sanctuaries and parks can only be accomplished through citizen-initiated work.

"All of the work that has been successful here has been volunteer, grassroots work," Wagner said. "We can regain control of urban parks this way."

Jennifer Gerrard, one Ameri-corps volunteer, said the event was successful because it allowed students to get directly involved

in cleaning up the University area.

"I think that because this was an opportunity for people to get involved in doing the hands-on work we had a huge response."
