

Second forum will meet on Hyundai

■ **DISCUSSION:** Citizens for Public Accountability will sponsor the symposium

The Citizens for Public Accountability will meet for a second public forum tonight on Hyundai's proposed \$1.3 billion computer chip factory.

Tonight's discussion, titled "Jobs, the Economy and the Semiconductor Industry," will be at 7 p.m. in the Churchill High School auditorium on West 18th Avenue and Bailey Hill Road. Speakers from high tech areas in Oregon and California will focus on chip-plant working conditions, wages, benefits and the effects of tax abatements and incentives on

the local economies of high-tech areas.

The Citizens for Public Accountability is a grassroots organization opposed to the Hyundai project.

"This is a reality check," said Bonny Bettman, a member of the Citizens for Public Accountability. "There are people from the Portland area and the Silicon Valley speaking who have more accurate information on wages, working conditions and government subsidies."

The Citizens for Public Accountability's first public meeting held June 19 drew 300 people to Harris Hall.

Hyundai is waiting for the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers to decide whether it will receive a wetlands-fill permit before breaking ground on its 1,000-

worker plant. The South Korean company wants to use 24 acres of wetlands in the Willow Creek Industrial Park in west Eugene to build its factory.

Hyundai officials have said that if the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers requires the company to submit further analyses of its construction plans in the form of an environmental impact statement, they will take their plant away from Eugene.

Bettman said the forum is the perfect opportunity for members of the Eugene community to let Hyundai know that its plans are still being scrutinized.

"I think Hyundai is trying to catch us asleep on this issue," she said. "If 600 people show up at this meeting, it'll show them that we are still looking at them."

Second person, 17, arrested for arson at Willamette High

Eugene police have charged and arrested a second person in the Oct. 2 arson fire of Willamette High School.

Acting on an anonymous tip received Sunday afternoon, Eugene police were led to 17-year-old Robert Frederick Bick of Eugene. Upon questioning Bick and independent sources, police obtained enough information to charge him with first-degree arson and first-degree criminal mischief.

Further investigation led police to uncover additional evidence tying Bick to three automobile arson fires in downtown Eugene in August. Bick had used a traf-

fic safety flare to torch an automobile on three occasions.

Bick, who is not a student at Willamette High School, was placed at the Lane County Juvenile Detention Center and is currently waiting for an arraignment.

Bick's arrest follows Wednesday's arrest of 18-year-old Jamal Seligman George in the Willamette High School arson fire that caused \$1 million in damage to the school.

Exhibit honors victims of domestic violence

■ **WITNESS:** Traveling display attempts to publicize the too often finality of domestic abuse

They were murdered by husbands, ex-boyfriends, a daughter and a great-grandson. They were killed at home and at work. The youngest was 15. The oldest was 85.

The 16 Oregon women who died as a result of domestic violence between 1993 and 1994 are being honored in the Silent Witness Exhibit, on display in the Eugene-Springfield area through the last two weeks of October.

The display of red, life-sized silhouettes opens today at Sacred

Heart Medical Center at 9 a.m., with opening comments presented at noon. The exhibit will be in the EMU on Oct. 20 from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m.

Womenspace and The Women of Color Caucus of the Oregon Coalition Against Domestic and Sexual Violence created Oregon's 18 Witnesses to represent 16 documented victims of domestic violence and two unknown victims. On each of the 16 silhouettes is printed a biography of the woman's murder.

The extra two Witnesses, one for an Oregon victim and one for a Lane County victim, were made because "undoubtedly there are women who have been killed by domestic violence [whose deaths] aren't attributed to domestic violence," said Sue Thompson of

Womenspace.

The first Silent Witness Exhibit was created by a coalition of women artists and writers in Minnesota who wanted to commemorate the 26 Minnesota women who died from domestic violence in 1990. They built silhouettes to represent each of the victims, adding one anonymous silhouette to represent domestic violence victims who were not counted. Oregon is the seventh state to create Silent Witnesses. As of September, 800 Silent Witnesses have been created in 17 states according to the Silent Witness National Initiative.

"[The display is] educational and it's thought provoking. It really gets your attention," Thompson said. "It's been incredibly powerful."

Students \$3.50
Faculty and Staff \$4.00

Annual flu immunizations are recommended for the following:

1. Healthy persons 65 years or older.
2. Persons with long-term heart or lung problems.
3. Persons with any of the following: kidney disease, cystic fibrosis, diabetes, anemia, severe asthma and conditions which compromise immune mechanism.

Influenza vaccine may be given to persons wishing to reduce their chances of catching the flu, persons who provide essential community services and students or others in schools or colleges.
