• "Still Crazy After All These Years" is the next major exhibit on display at the Springfield Museum, at 590 Main St. The new show features traditional crazy quilts from the Victorian era, and runs Wednesday, Oct. 18 through Friday, Dec. 22.

An opening reception and book signing by Dorothy Bond, author of "Crazy Quilt

Stitches," is scheduled at 7 p.m. Friday, Oct. 20, at the museum. The reception is free and open to the public. On Nov. 4, at 2 p.m., a quilt sharing is scheduled at the museum and will be led by quilter Wendy Hafdal. People are invited to bring all kinds of quilts for the sharing.

While admission is free, donations of \$1 per adult are suggested. The museum is open 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., Wednesday through Friday, and noon to 4 p.m. on Saturdays. Free parking is available in the lot next to the museum.

The museum is housed in the historical Oregon Power Company building. The three-story brick structure was built in 1911 and renovated for the museum in 1980. Women: New group will help women of color

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"Women are always trying to fight on two fronts," Welch said. "Society seems to want women to separate themselves [by gender and race], but it cannot be done."

The facilitators also hope the group will serve as a point of unity for women of color already

involved in cultural organizations such as Black Women of Achievement and the Indigenous Women's Group.

"We are all women and we are all people of color," Shigeoka said. "This group will allow us to spend time together as both."

Flu: Shot produces very few side effects

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Those with kidney disease, cystic fibrosis, diabetes, anemia, severe asthma, heart or lung problems or chronic medical conditions should also be immunized.

Registered nurse Sharon Harbert said the vaccine has few side effects and added that not many people experience them.

"Seventy percent of those vaccinated experience no [side effects] and the remaining 30 percent may experience a sore arm," she said.

The vaccine is given in late October because it takes two weeks for the immunity to build. Flu season peaks between December and March but usually doesn't hit Oregon until after Christmas, Harbert said.

Last year 1,500 vaccinations were given in the health center. Every year a new vaccine is developed and this year's vaccination protects from three kinds of flu.

Harbert said the flu is not a cold and can lead to pneumonia in some cases.

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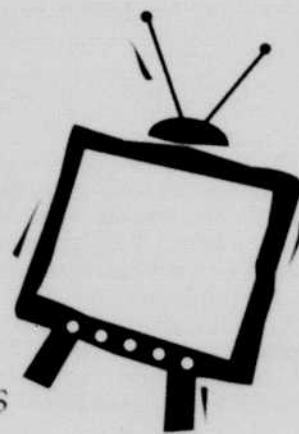
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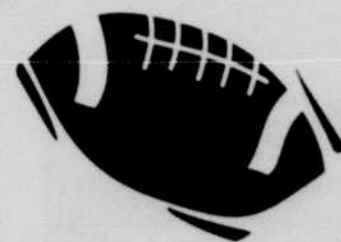
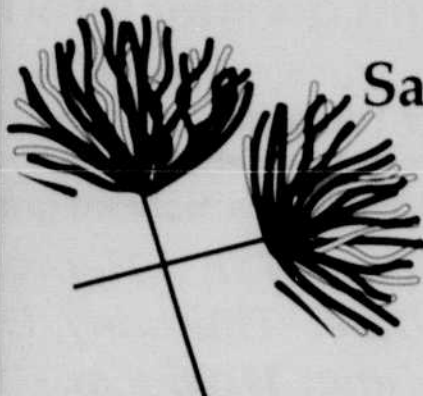
