Judge gives o.k. on timber sales

■ **FOREST:** Northwest timber sales will be released except endangered species lands

EUGENE (AP) — A federal judge on Tuesday ordered the federal government to begin releasing timber sales on Northwest national forests that have been held up for environmental concerns.

U.S. District Judge Michael Hogan also ordered the Interior and Agriculture departments to submit reports every two weeks starting next Wednesday on progress made toward selling the timber.

Hogan issued his orders in response to requests from the timber industry. The industry argues the Clinton administration has been slow in carrying out congressional directives to cut more timber.

Hogan ruled last month that Congress intended to release timber sales that had been awarded but held up. The orders apply to all sale units except those where a threatened or endangered bird species, such as the northern spotted owl, is known to be nesting.

Much of the disputed timber is old growth. Government lawyers indicated they intended to appeal.

"We got exactly what we wanted," Chris West of the Northwest Forestry Association said after the two-hour hearing. Government lawyers did not comment after the hearing.

Tom Tuchmann, who oversees the Clinton administration's Northwest forest policy from the Office of Forestry and Economic Development in Portland, was not immediately available for comment, a spokeswoman said.

The legislation waived laws protecting fish and wildlife through 1996 so logging can be expedited in Northwest forests with spotted owls, and in forests nationwide where dead and dying trees pose a fire hazard.

The Clinton administration feels logging would upset the delicate balance of the Northwest forest plan. The plan went into effect this year to allow limited logging to resume in Northwest national forests that had been locked up to protect habitat for the spotted owl.

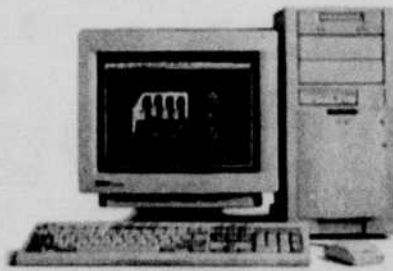
