Seminar: Readers must keep innocence

■ **LEARNING:** Visiting professor believes reading is special to people's lives

Readers should never lose their innocence, a visiting professor from Boston University said Friday.

Roger Shattuck, a French professor at Boston and president of the Association of Literary Scholars and Critics, believes readers have a tendency to approach a book with too much skepticism. When they do that, they forget the simple joys of reading.

Instead, readers should remain open-minded when they are reading a book, he said.

On Friday, he gave a seminar to approximately 30 people in Room 159 Prince Lucien Campbell titled

"Intellectual Craftsmanship: How to Read a Book."

Shattuck said readers should follow four rules of thumb when reading:

1. Read blind. Readers should ignore who wrote the book, he said. Treat the book as if it were written by an anonymous author.

2. Read with both eyes open. One eye should read with alertness or between the lines — to be somewhat skeptical, he said. The other eye should read with innocence. With time, reading can be performed with both of these eyes almost simultaneously.

3. Read with one's whole life. This was well defined by the French word, "coenesthesia," he said. "Coenesthesia" is the "life sense" or "the aggregate of sensations, both external and internal, that gives one the organic awareness of being alive as oneself in

the world."

4. Use notes and files to assist reading.

Shattuck said reading plays a special role in life. "Reading grows up with everything we do," he said.

However important reading may be, students don't view it the right way, said Steven Shankman, English professor and director of the Humanities Center.

"I don't think students enjoy reading enough," he said.

James Earl, professor of English, agrees. "Students read with no observation," he said during a discussion time. "They turn the page and hope [the message] will come later."

Shankman said professors should not pretend they always know everything about a book in front of their students. Instead, they should pick it up as if it were new each time.

Police: Station may be built near Sacred Heart

puter system that will enable officers to have access to police records. A video camera will also monitor the outside of the building to guard against graffiti, and officers will have access to the trailer 24 hours a day.

The station's services will be somewhat limited at the beginning. Eugene residents and students can use the station to report small crimes such as car and bike thefts, Drullinger said.

"We're encouraging people to use the emergency system still if suspects are involved, or a crime is in progress," Drullinger said. "If there is an emergency, they should dial 911."

Drullinger will staff the station part-time until January when permanent staff working full-time will take over.

The station is part of a long-term community polic-

ing plan, adopted by the City Council in 1991, which would decentralize and branch out police protection to individual neighborhoods throughout Eugene.

"A big part of community policing is for neighborhoods to get to know their officers and for the officers to teach community members how to protect themselves," Drullinger said.

Plans are being developed to build a permanent police station in the parking lot of Sacred Heart Medical Center across from 7-Eleven within the next two years, Green said.

"What I've noticed is that when police are down here enforcing the law, things are quiet," Green said. "When there is not a public safety presence, it doesn't take long for the problem to come back."

"I think having uniformed police officers in this area is a real key to regaining control of the neighborhood," he said.
