

Costume shops offer Halloween variety

Wizards, pirates and witches will come out of hiding tonight to prowl the streets and charm partygoers with their goulsh smiles.

Hidden under the hats and patches are the people who searched for the perfect ensemble for this holiday. Most got a little help from the costume and party shops around town that have been displaying creative outfits for the last several weeks.

Linda Collins, owner of Time Warp Costumes, said usually there is one particular theme that people will go with. For instance, she said one year people went with the Civil War theme because the series North and South appeared on television a week before Halloween.

This year there isn't an overall theme for costumes. Some people are staying with the traditional costume while others have original ideas.

The most popular costumes she has seen this year were the medieval and colonial type along with the traditional poodle skirts, flappers, batman, Brady Bunch, vampires, miniskirts and gogo boots.

At The Imaginaries, another local costume shop, pirates were one of the hottest-selling costumes. Victoria Machado, the owner and designer of the shop said she went as far as making costumes of a family of pirates including a dog pirate, which was a Dalmatian with an eye patch.

She has sold a variety of costumes. Men seemed to stick to the wizard costume whereas women went with the French maid costume, she said.

The cow costume sold out at Chazpro Family Fun Shop, one of the owners, Barbara Poznanovic said.

Chazpro has sold a lot of masks, make-up, black afro wigs, straight black hair wigs,

hoods and capes.

"The Grimm Reaper, Dracula, Raggedy Ann and Andy and the Cat In The Hat are popular selling costumes too," Poznanovic said.

Traditional costumes like the harem girl, clowns, cheerleaders and the Flintstones seemed to sell pretty well at Backstage on Broadway, an employee, Kim Christensen said.

individuals were involved.

Two of the three injured students have been released from the hospital. The police have not yet confirmed whether the third victim has been released.

According to Eugene Police Department Sergeant Stan Reeves, there were approximately four police officers patrolling the campus area at that time. Reeves said there would not be an increase in officers patrolling the campus area as a result of Saturday's assault.

"This is a spontaneous situational stabbing," Reeves said. "These things happen; it isn't any different than if it hap-

pened in South Eugene."

Reeves said the stabbing had nothing to do with the amount of officers in the area.

"It wasn't a factor in the stabbing," Reeves said. "Stabbings are not unusual."

Three suspects, each 17-years-old, were taken into custody and lodged at Skipworth Detention Center on charges of first degree assault and conspiracy to commit assault. Police investigations are continuing at this time and further suspects are being sought. Victims' identities are being withheld at this time for reason of on-going investigations.

Three students stabbed in fight near campus

■ **CRIME:** Three juvenile suspects are in custody

Three University students were taken to Sacred Heart Hospital for treatment of stab wounds late Saturday evening after a fight broke out in front of a campus bar.

The incident began at approximately 11:30 p.m. when two groups of males passed each other. After a member of one group bumped into someone in the other group, a fight occurred in front of Guido's bar, in which 10-12
