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Ducks take third at Texas tourney

■ **GOLF:** Oregon takes third place at its last tournament of the fall season

The Oregon women's golf team dropped one spot to third place at the Lady Cardinal Invitational in Beaumont, Texas, Tuesday, ending the Ducks' fall season.

Following the first two rounds on Monday, the Ducks were tied with Tulane and North Texas for second place with a team score of 646. But the Ducks couldn't hold off North Texas as the Eagles finished with a combined

score of 962, two strokes ahead of the Ducks' score of 964.

Oregon senior Christel Tomori had her best tournament of the year as she finished in second place overall with a combined score of 227. Tomori was tied for second with Tulane's Becky Carr going into Tuesday's final round, but shot a 74 — her best score of the tournament — to capture sole position of second place.

Senior Susie Roh tied for 11th place with a combined score of 239, three spots better than her Monday placing. Redshirt freshman Kristen Berney (249), senior Tara Keller (254) and true freshman Jeanne Eilers (255) rounded out the Oregon contin-

gent.

The Ducks shot a strong first round with a team score of 316, but shot a 330 in the second to drop out of first place. Oregon then came back with a 318 in the third round to fight off Tulane for sole possession of third place.

Oregon State led the team competition going into Tuesday and finished in first place with a team score of 941.

Under the guidance of new head coach Renee Baumgartner, the Ducks played a larger than usual fall schedule this season in order to prepare them for the spring season, when teams advance to the NCAA tournament in May.

A deal with the Atlanta Hawks is lower on the list, the newspaper said.

Bass said the team was continuing to negotiate with Mourning's agent, David Falk. Messages left by The Associated Press at Falk's office were not returned.

On Tuesday, the 6-foot-10 center avoided reporters who staged a 3 1/2-hour vigil outside the Hornets' practice complex, where team employees used elaborate car-switches with Mourning's sport utility vehicle

to aid his getaway.

Mourning's teammates are not happy about the prospects of trying to improve on last year's club-record 50 victories without their top scorer, rebounder and shot blocker. He has averaged at least 21 points a game each season since joining the Hornets as the second pick in the 1992 draft.

Bass spoke Tuesday at the team's practice facility in neighboring Fort Mill, S.C. Reporters were allowed into the main gym to meet with Bass only after the players and coach Allan Bristow had already left for the locker room, which was closed to the

media.

Outside the practice complex, several players said they'd prefer the Hornets, who are already saddled with Larry Johnson's \$84 million contract, not trade Mourning.

"You don't get a quality center like Alonzo very often," said 42-year-old Robert Parish, one of Mourning's backups. "You just don't replace Alonzo Mourning."

"We'd really hate to see him go," forward Scott Burrell said, shaking his head. "If they're going to trade him, I hope they get some great players for him."
