

Club Hockey wins, ties Portland

At times, it looked like a boxing match might break out.

The Oregon Club Sports hockey team expected the Portland Junior Bucks to come into Lane County Ice ready to throw blows. That's what they're known for — that's how they play.

"I don't like fighting," Portland head coach Ken Herman said. "I'll take a player's number down, and if he doesn't calm down, he'd better keep his head up."

His attitude was evident throughout this weekend's series at Lane County Ice. The Junior Bucks spent more time holding sticks and throwing high elbows than the Oregon State football team does running options. In the end, the lack of concentration hurt them.

Saturday night's match-up ended in a 2-2 tie. The Ducks should

have won the game — they out shot Portland 46-12 — but the Junior Bucks goalie was unbelievable, making more spectacular plays than could be counted. It should have been a disappointing night for Oregon, but something clicked out on the ice at the end of the game, and for once it wasn't the door of the penalty box.

The Ducks drastically cut back on penalty minutes, and weren't having problems setting up the play or finding the open man, as has been true all season. Even with the tie, after the game, it was all smiles.

"We're starting to come together," Oregon defenseman Seth Prouser said. "I think we could get on a roll."

On Sunday afternoon, the Ducks did just that, scoring the most goals it had all season, frustrating the Junior Bucks into a 6

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- 4 loss. Flint Doungchak scooped twice, and Doug Johnson got the go-ahead goal with 4:52 left in the second period.

With the win, Oregon improved its record to 2-3-1 overall, while the Junior Bucks dropped to 0-4-1. Oregon travels to Stanford this weekend to take on the Cardinal.

Ducks fall in third round of Rolex Invitational

■ **TENNIS:** Three individuals and two doubles teams lose during third round

SAN JOSE, Calif. — All three Oregon singles players and both doubles teams lost third round matches here Sunday in the Rolex NorCal Invitational Men's Tennis Tournament and were eliminated in the single-elimination event.

Juniors John DeVoss and Dougal Williams and freshman Carlos Navarro lost their singles matches Sunday after all three had won in the previous rounds. DeVoss was

upended by Stanford's Misha Palecel while California's Chris Santoso beat Navarro and Washington's Scott Moore beat Williams.

The doubles team of junior Jeff Strong and freshman Miguel Arriaga and the team of senior Hans Forsberg and Williams also both lost.

"We had some tight matches but just didn't convert," first year coach Chris Russel said. "DeVoss was leading in both sets before losing 7-6, 7-6 and our other two singles matches went three sets."

The Ducks next competition will come on Nov. 20, when the team travels to Hawaii over Thanksgiving.

Trojans survive a Stanford upset by scoring in the final minute

■ **PAC-10:** USC moves within one game of a Rose Bowl berth with victory over Cardinal

LOS ANGELES (AP) — For the third week in a row, Southern California started slowly and then scrambled to catch up in the fourth quarter. For the second time, it worked.

The Trojans didn't subdue a stubborn Stanford team until Keyshawn Johnson caught an 8-yard pass from Kyle Wachholtz with 39 seconds remaining for a 31-30 victory Saturday.

USC moved within a game of earning its first Rose Bowl berth in six years. The Trojans (7-1-1,

5-0-1 Pacific-10) need only beat last-place Oregon State, a team they have not lost to since 1967, next week to play in the New Year's Day game.

Failing that, a victory against crosstown rival UCLA on Nov. 18 would get the Trojans to Pasadena.

USC rose two spots to No. 12 in The Associated Press rankings Sunday.

"We stumbled and bumbled coming out again, but I don't know why we didn't play better early," USC coach John Robinson said. "We seem to struggle for a long time in a game, but once it starts going, we move pretty good."

Wachholtz turned up his game

with the Trojans trailing by five with 2:52 remaining and 80 yards to go for a touchdown.

Johnson set up the game-winning play with a 32-yard run down the sideline that brought USC to Stanford's 17-yard line. Then Johnson broke free and Wachholtz found him in the end zone.

"It's an awesome feeling," said Wachholtz, who has shared quarterback duties all season with Brad Otton.

Robinson's pattern had been to play Otton in the first and third quarters and Wachholtz in the second and fourth periods.

Wachholtz was 15-of-28 for 198 yards with one interception. "All year, I've been coming in

(during) the fourth quarter and getting mop-up time because we had already beaten people," he said. Wachholtz, a fifth-year senior, played the final three quarters after Otton sustained a mild concussion in the first period. The Trojans trailed 16-0 as Otton was 1-of-7 for 38 yards and an interception.

The week before, Otton rallied USC with three fourth-quarter touchdowns to tie Washington 21-21. The Trojans failed to comeback against Notre Dame in a 38-10 loss on Oct. 21.

USC will have a better overall record than No. 22 Washington (5-3-1, 4-1-1), which lost to No. 17 Oregon 24-22 Saturday, if the teams tie for first place. Every

other Pac-10 team has at least two conference losses.

Stanford (5-3-1, 3-3) took a 30-25 lead on a 6-yard run by Greg Comella with 2:57 remaining. Brian Manning then dropped a 2-point conversion pass in the end zone.

The Trojans had gone ahead 25-24 with 7:18 left on a 1-yard plunge by Rodney Sermons and a 2-point conversion from Wachholtz to Chris Miller.

Stanford led 24-17 at halftime as Eric Abrams kicked field goals of 25, 24 and 32 yards and Mark Butterfield threw for one touchdown and a 2-point conversion. Butterfield finished 29-of-47 for 345 yards.
