

Keska cruises as Ducks qualify for the NCAA Championships

CROSS COUNTRY: Keska won the regional meet and the Ducks qualified for the national meet

The Oregon men's cross country team qualified for the NCAA Championships by placing second in the District VIII qualifying meet Saturday. The Ducks finished with 89 points and came in second to Stanford, who had 53 points.

The Ducks beat Stanford two

weeks ago at the Pacific-10 Conference meet but this time around the Cardinal prevailed. Both schools will race against each other again as the District VIII representatives in the NCAA Championships in Ames, Iowa on Nov. 20.

Oregon coach Bill Dellinger, who has guided 20 teams to the NCAA Championships in the last 25 years, said the Ducks were there to qualify for the NCAA's, and that is just what they did.

"It's a qualifying meet," Dellinger said. "It would have

been nice to win but on the other side of the coin we did qualify for the NCAA's, and I think we can still run better."

Even though the team came in second, Oregon's Karl Keska won the meet finishing in 30 minutes, 11.9 seconds. Keska, a junior, added the District VIII individual championship to his Pac-10 championship. Keska has been the first collegiate to cross the finish line in all four meets he has participated in this season.

"Karl ran a great race," Dellinger said. "He was in con-

trol all the way. He's running really well right now."

Keska easily handled the competition as he beat the second-place finisher Uli Steidl of Portland by a full 17 seconds.

Oregon sophomore Matt Davis had another strong showing as he finished in fifth place and was less than three seconds behind the fourth-place runner. Davis was the Ducks only runner to go to the national meet last year and his good finish in this meet helped to bring the rest of the Oregon squad into a qualifying spot for the NCAA

meet.

"Matthew has been very consistent all season," Dellinger said.

Other runners for the Ducks include sophomore Daniel Das Neves who finished 14th, David Gurry (22nd), Rick Cantwell (33rd), Micah Davis and Scott Nicholas, who did not score.

Dellinger said he felt bad for Cantwell, who lost his shoe in the first 200 yards and couldn't get it back on. Cantwell was forced to finish the race barefoot on the mostly grass and asphalt course in Woodland, Wash.
