

City councilman denies moving from ward that he represents

■ **CONTROVERSY:** Kevin Hornbuckle says he will live with friends until his term ends next year

Eugene City Councilman Kevin Hornbuckle disputed rumors yesterday that he had apparently moved to a new residence outside the ward he represents, which would force him to resign from his council seat.

Hornbuckle, who lived in a rental house on West 17th Avenue, has represented 3rd Ward for almost three years. At the end of October, Hornbuckle and his wife moved from this address, which is now vacant.

Tracye May, Hornbuckle's wife, bought a house on Adams Street on Oct. 30, which is in the Whiteaker neighborhood. U.S. West's directory assistance lists Adams Street as Hornbuckle's address. The phone number he conducted the interview from was also registered to that address.

But Hornbuckle says he is still living in Ward 3 and will be staying with various friends until his

term expires at the end of next year. He said he is a renter and has no permanent address, so the move is not that big of a deal. But he would not give information on where he was staying in 3rd Ward, citing concerns for his friends and family.

The Eugene City Charter says council members must live at least 50 percent of the time in the district they represent, said Phil Weiler, a spokesman for the city of Eugene.

Hornbuckle had told council members he planned to move sometime soon and would not seek re-election, Weiler said. He said he was aware of the residency requirements for council members.

Weiler said last Thursday a courier tried to deliver a packet to Hornbuckle's house, but the house was empty. He has not given the city a new address, but he did pick up his packet at the city

hall complex yesterday.

The city does not check on the council members to make sure they are in the ward they represent.

The Adams Street address, in 7th Ward, is currently inhabited by Shawn Boles.

One council member has stepped down in the last few years because he moved out of his district, Weiler said.

Retired UO professor missing since Saturday

■ **MISSING:** Ronald Rousseve left his house with his keys, leaving no note behind

A retired University professor has been declared missing as of Saturday.

Ronald Joseph Rousseve, professor emeritus of counseling psychology, apparently left his Eugene home between the hours of 4 p.m. and 6 p.m. Saturday and has yet to return, according to police reports.

Rousseve's wife Barbara told police her husband had been "depressed and reclusive" for the past year. Rousseve had an appendectomy some time in the past nine months, and since then has been indifferent and lethargic toward his daily routine.

Rousseve's wife told police her husband left his wallet at home, but his house keys are missing and are presumed to be with him. Rousseve did not leave a note to his wife indi-

cating where he may have gone, which is not typical, his wife said.

Rousseve, 63, is a black male and is 5 feet 6 inches tall. He has brown eyes and weighs approximately 140 lbs. At the time of his disappearance, Rousseve was wearing a blue T-shirt and blue jeans.

Rousseve is not on any medication, his wife said. Police assume he is on foot, as his wife had the car when Rousseve apparently left his home.

Rousseve's wife said the situation is "extremely unsettling."

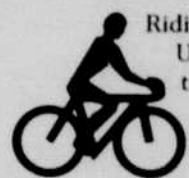
"Under the circumstances, we're doing the best we can," she said. "We're hoping for the best."

Maureen Shine, deputy director of communications for the University, confirmed that Rousseve, who retired last year, had been with the University since Sept. 16, 1968. Rousseve received his bachelor's of science and master of arts degrees from Xavier University in 1954 and his Ph.D. from Notre Dame in 1958.

Equipment

Riding a bicycle to and from the University campus is a great way to travel. We encourage its use, but we all need to keep in mind the equipment, rules, and regulations to make bicycle riding fun and safe.

- Make sure the bicycle you are riding is equipped with brakes adequate to skid on clean dry pavement.

- Starting one-half hour after sunset a headlight must be visible 500 feet ahead and a red reflector visible 600 feet to the rear. Those who fail to display the light and reflector are subject to citation and fine.

- Protect your life, wear a helmet.

Bicycle Licensing

All faculty, staff and students who operate, store or park bicycles on the University of Oregon campus must register their bicycles with the University of Oregon Office of Public Safety. Unregistered bicycles are subject to citation and fine.



Bicycle Parking

Bicycles shall be parked, stored or left outdoors on the University campus only in areas specifically designated by the presence of bike racks or other devices for the parking of bicycles. However, bicycles may be stored, parked or left in any area or room which has been assigned to the registered bicycle owner, e.g., office, residence hall, or student family living quarters.

Bicycles may be cited and fined or impounded if:

- Trees, handrails, hallways, parking meters or signs are used as a bike rack.

- Parked or stored in such a way that a safety hazard is created.
- Bicycle is blocking a walkway.



Bicycle Use on Campus

In addition to the state laws and city ordinances governing the operation of motorized and non-motorized vehicles, the University of Oregon has its own set of rules and regulations that must be followed for your safety and the safety of others.

Bicycles involved in a collision are required to render aid as appropriate, call the UO Office of Public Safety, and remain at the scene until released by an officer.

Those who fail to observe the following rules are subject to citation and fine.

- Bicycle riders must proceed cautiously at all times, and are not to exceed the posted speed of 15 miles per hour.
- Walk your bicycle on sidewalks.
- Riding a bicycle on sidewalks, walkways and landscape is prohibited.
- Bicycle riders must yield right of way to pedestrians and disabled persons at all times.
- Bicycle riders shall use the designated bike lane when classes are in session.



Roller Skates and Skateboards

Skating across the University campus can be a fun and easy way to get from class to class. Remember, you share the campus with many others. Roller skate or skateboard cautiously. Here are a few facts to keep in mind as you skate across campus.

Skaters who fail to observe the following can be cited.

- A helmet and pads are suggested for safety, but not required.
- Use of roller skates or skateboards within University buildings is prohibited.
- Acrobatics or other stunts are prohibited.
- Users of roller skates and skateboards must yield the right-of-way to pedestrians.
- All skaters and skateboard users must obey all campus stop, yield, and dismount signs.



Citation Schedule

- Blocking Violations (traffic, ramps, entrance/exit).....\$10.00
- Prohibited Parking (no bicycle parking sign, yellow zones, landscape area, library area).....\$5.00
- Unauthorized storage.....\$5.00
- Impound Fee.....\$5.00
- Failure to register bicycle.....\$10.00
- Failure to yield to a pedestrian.....\$15.00
- Skating in a building or structure.....\$20.00
- Acrobatic or stunt skating.....\$20.00

Any University security officer or other person specifically authorized by the Director of Public Safety may impound any parked, stored or abandoned bicycle causing a safety hazard or cite any bicycle rider who violates University bicycle rules.

University security officers or other personnel authorized to remove and impound bicycles shall not be liable to the owner of the securing device.
