Fall: Recycled leaves used for compost

to place their leaves in the street more than a week before their scheduled pickup because this can contribute to drainage and storm water pollution problems, according to a public works brochure.

Property owners will be responsible for removing any leaves left in front of their homes, after the last scheduled pickup in each area.

DaVee, who has worked for the city for almost 28 years, said every year there seems to be more leaves to pickup.

"Ten years ago, maybe 10 to 12 trucks could pick up all of the leaves in a days time," he said.

The leaf pick-up program involves many workers and four vehicles.

First a buncher, or a special tractor, piles the leaves, DaVee said. Then a backhoe scoops them into a dump truck. They are then taken to the city's private dump or delivered to homes for compost. After the backhoe goes through, a sweeper cleans up leftovers.

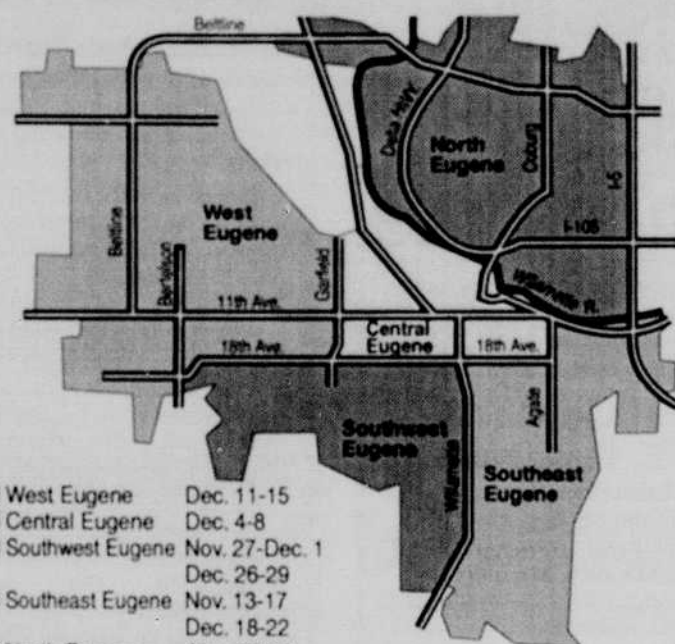
Officers confiscated a glass water pipe from a resident of the University Inn on Oct. 18. The resident director seized the water pipe, or bong, from the resident after noticing a smell suggesting marijuana coming from his room. The resident director notified the Office of Public Safety, who in turn notified the police. The bong was destroyed by the police on the same day.

The Kappa Kappa Gamma Sorority house was the target of vandalism on Nov. 5. According to police reports, a male suspect approached a west side door and kicked out a pane of glass. No entry was made into the house and the suspect has not been located.

Police are currently searching for a suspect in the attempted murder of a Eugene man. Dennis Paul Saksa, also known as "Hawk," is being sought by detectives for the assault of Leroy Annis Dawson. Dawson was assaulted by Saksa in a West Eugene residence on Nov. 1. Dawson is in critical condition at Peace Health Hospital. Saksa is described as a white male, 45 years old, 5 feet nine inches tall and weighing about 210 pounds. Saksa has collar length brown hair and blue eyes. Police believe Saksa is driving a silver, 1989 Subaru coupe, Oregon license UEA 295, which belongs to Dawson.

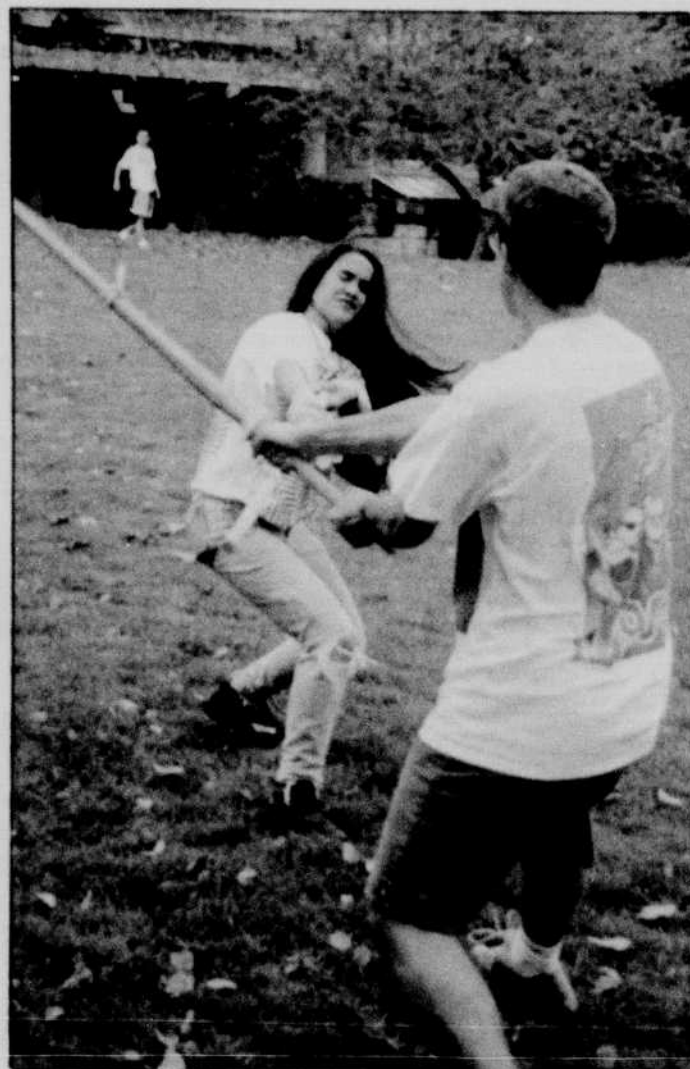
exists, Public Works Maintenance crews follow a schedule that ensures systematic coverage of the city and controls the cost of the program.
