False ID equipment confiscated

■ **OLCC:** Inspectors suspect underage
University student of committing crime

The Oregon Liquor Control Commission recently reinforced its efforts to stop underage drinking at the source.

Last Thursday, OLCC inspectors confiscated sophisticated computer equipment used to create fraudulent drivers' licenses and other false documents.

The confiscated equipment, which included printers, laminators, scanners, records and a supply of fake identification cards, was seized from a house located on East 18th Avenue, said OLCC Enforcement Inspector Steve Syron. The suspect is an underage University student, he said.

Syron said investigations are underway to determine how many ID cards had been created by this individual. Cards were made for a variety of states,

he said.

The investigation was initiated when an OLCC inspector received a fraudulent driver's license from a clerk. The clerk had confiscated the license from a minor who was attempting to purchase beer. Officers from the OLCC obtained a search warrant for an off-campus residence.

"This is an on-going problem around campus," Syron said. "We finally developed enough information leading us to this house."

Syron said he was unable to elaborate further on the case because the investigation is pending.

While the possession of fake IDs around Eugene is high, the actual creation of IDs in Eugene is low compared with big cities, he said.

"It's pretty rare that we track someone down who's been creating them out of Eugene," he said.

The creation of fake IDs is a Class C felony. People convicted of forgery can face a five-year prison sentence or a fine of up to \$100,000.

Young students learn environmental awareness

■ **EDUCATION:** Stream walk
volunteers teach students
and plan future programs

The students at Howard Elementary School in Eugene learned how to make fish, create rain and spin the Web of Life on Monday.

Streamwalk volunteers visited three classes and taught students about our environment. The Streamwalk program works to improve local waterways, plant trees and test water quality. It works in conjunction with OSPiRG.

"To us, education is the most important factor," said Sarah Scribner, coordinator of OSPiRG's environmental education program. "That's what we're working on."

The Streamwalk volunteers led students through a series of

hands-on activities. In a game called Web of Life, students learned that everything in the environment is connected. Students also studied fish adaptations and then created their own fish. They reproduced the sounds of raindrops by snapping their fingers.

"Actually, the kids are really into the learning," said Deborah Mikulina, an Americorps volunteer. "They're really excited about it."

Because the project is sponsored by Americorps, the elementary students were required to take a pretest before the activities, and a post-test after, to measure what they learned. According to Mikulina, the post-tests revealed that the students had picked up most of the information they were presented with.

Streamwalk is planning future school visits and commu-

nity programs. It will hold a workshop at the YMCA on Tuesday and will teach at Harris Elementary School after Thanksgiving.

"We want to develop relationships," Scribner said.

The representatives who visit the schools are mostly volunteers and OSPiRG interns. Some Environmental Studies courses require 40 hours of community service; this education project could fulfill some of those hours.

Streamwalk is also looking into developing a curriculum on water issues with Doris Ranch and Mt. Pisgah.

Beginning Jan. 20, Streamwalk will lead a five-week Saturday program for kindergarten through fifth-grade children. The program will concentrate on giving the children a hands-on experience with nature.
