Guide: Keeping privacy is easier than you think

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10. Type your net ID here instead of "john."

11. Enter nameserver password: Type your password. It won't show on the screen.

9. Now you'll see this on your screen: "200:uo-john:Hi how are you? ph> "

10. Type in: me

When you type in me, you'll get a whole list of information about yourself. Note that this is not available for the public unless someone has your password or guesses your password (which can happen). Some of this information you can change or delete, and some of it you can't.

Here's what you're likely to see that you CAN change: phone, address and password. Most of the rest of it you CAN'T change.

11. Let's say you want to delete your phone number. At the ph> prompt:

12. Type: make phone=""

If you type exactly that, you will get this: "200: 1 entry changed." You're either going to get that message or something like this: "599:Did not understand make command." If you get any kind of error message, go back and try it again, typing it EXACTLY LIKE IT SAYS.

13. Let's say you want to change your address — 123 West 13th — to your other address, which is P.O. Box 123. At the ph> prompt:

Type: change address=123 West 13th make address="P.O.Box 123"

You should get the following response on your screen: "200:1 entry changed."

15. To check and make sure that you changed what you wanted, at the ph> prompt:

Type: me

You will get the listing of your

personal info on your screen, and you can check the things you changed to see if it worked.

16. Now let's say you want to change your password from "bozo" to "myMomsName." DO NOT do it with the change and make commands like above. At the ph>passwd prompt:

Enter new password: myMomsName

This won't show on your screen.

17. Type it again: myMomsName

It won't show on your screen again.

You'll then see: "200: entry changed"

You'll get either that message or some error message such as: "-599:Argument 4 etc." BE SURE YOU TYPE YOUR ENTRIES EXACTLY AS SPECIFIED or you'll get error messages. Because information on this database is updated every week by the Computing Center, and they get their information from the Registrar Office, whatever changes you make will be changed back again unless you fix your listing for "no updates."

18. At the ph> prompt:

Type: change no_update=yes

19. When you're done, you'll see the ph> prompt again:

Type: quit

If you end up in tears over this because you're electronically challenged, you can go to the Registrar Office and fill out a simple form asking them to delete your information from its database.

If they tell you that your only options are to leave it all in there or to take it all out, you should refuse to accept this answer. They told me that at first, too, and then one of their sharper employees told me that you can selectively edit your listing, and she did it for me. Good luck!
