

State senator may try to increase speed limit

■ **SPEED:** Lawmaker may introduce legislation that will raise the speed limit to as much as 75 mph

PORTLAND (AP) — A state lawmaker says he is ready to propose legislation to increase some speed limits on Oregon highways now that President Clinton has signed a transportation bill that gets rid of federal speed limits.

State Sen. Randy Miller, R-Lake Oswego, says he may introduce legislation at a special session in February that could raise speed limits on some Oregon highways to as much as 75 mph. But that worries state transportation officials who say that the death toll on Oregon highways this year could jump as much as 15 percent.

"Too many people are dying right now on our highways, and I would not be anxious to see speeds increase," said Ed Marges, manager of the transportation department's safety section.

Even without the federal limits, state law sets the highway speed limit at 55 mph, except on rural interstate freeways where the limit is 65 mph.

Miller, a longtime proponent for increasing some speed limits, said he would like to make the posted speeds a recommendation that is left up to a driver's judgment.

In addition to increases to 70 or 75 mph on some stretches of interstate freeway, Miller said increases on other highways would be reasonable. He said, for example, the portion of U.S.

Highway 97 between Bend and Redmond is newer and in better shape than some parts of Interstate 5 — and yet the speed limit on U.S. 97 has been 55 mph.

"That, over time, just breeds disrespect for the law," Miller said, adding that he supports reduced speed limits in hazardous areas such as Interstate 5's Terwilliger curves in south Portland.

Miller said he would like to see a transportation committee established to consider changes — and he'd like to give local officials more control.

"We ought to ... allow local areas to determine what is a safe and prudent speed in areas where they have jurisdiction," Miller said.

Marges said the state could consider changes on a case-by-case basis. But he would want the changes to be monitored to compare accidents and deaths on that stretch of highway to previous years.

Last year, 494 people died on Oregon highways, Marges said. This year, that number is expected to jump to about 570 people.

"That is real disturbing to us," he said, adding that — by comparison — 1990 to 1994 were the lowest fatality years since 1970.

He attributed the increase to a basic disregard for safety, which includes increased speeds and the use of alcohol.

"People just aren't thoughtful or courteous behind the wheel," Marges said. "People just don't think it's going to happen to them."

In the news the next day, said detective Ron Roberts. Hayward later told detective Tracy Belshi he had flashbacks of the attack, but his memory was vague.

Hayward did not remember seeing blood or hitting Donna Ream, a clerk who was almost beaten to death in the attack, although he believes he probably hit her, he told detectives. Ream testified on Nov. 16 that Hayward was one of her

assaultants.

When Hayward was shown police pictures of Fran Wall's beaten body during interviews, he said to detectives, "I can't see myself doing something like that."

He later added that he could be capable of such a crime under the influence of LSD.

When asked during police questioning whether he intended to kill Wall when he entered the Dari Mart, he claimed he did not, Ryan told Deputy Dis-

trict Attorney Bob Gorham.

When Belshi asked Hayward how he felt about Wall's murder, he replied that he didn't care, she said.

"[Wall] was meant to die. It was her time to die," Belshi quoted Hayward as saying. "There's a time for everyone to die."

Mullen will begin his cross-examination on Thursday and he expects to finish by Friday, he told the court.

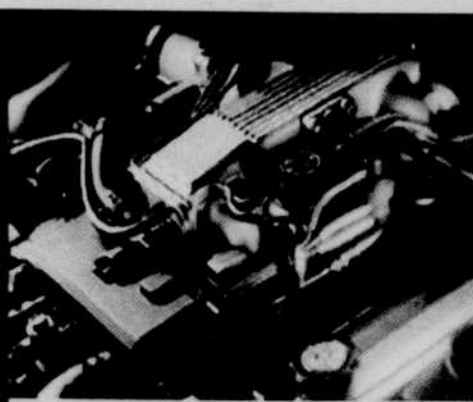
