Indians looking to erect new gaming facility in Smith's Home Furnishings building

SPRINGFIELD (AP) — An Indian tribe based in Coos Bay wants to put a \$22 million gambling center along Interstate 5 in the building vacated by bankrupt Smith's Home Furnishings.



The Confederated Tribes of Coos, Lower Umpqua and Siuslaw Indians has options to buy the 50,000-square-foot site in the Gateway section of Springfield as well as a seven-acre site adjoining the Windward Inn near U.S. Highway 101 in Florence, said Greg Norton, tribal Chairman.

"We're obligated to become self-sufficient, and we're looking at the Lane County area because one-fourth of our tribe resides here," Norton said.

The proposed casino would feature about 400 slot machines and about 100 table games. Alcoholic drinks would not be served. It would have an annual payroll of \$8.8 million.

Commission investigates group for use of funds supporting House Speaker Newt Gingrich

WASHINGTON (AP) — Bolstering its case that a political organization founded by Newt Gingrich violated federal law, the government released court records Wednesday suggesting the group spent heavily on "Newt support" during his tough 1990 re-election battle.



The group, GOPAC, has steadfastly maintained that it did not help any federal candidates before 1991.

But the Federal Election Commission asserted that its new evidence proves the organization was illegally assisting federal candidates before then, particularly the future House speaker.

The FEC's filing in U.S. District Court included internal memos, meeting minutes, tape recordings and notes showing GOPAC paid for consultants "to help Newt think" and to "inoculate Newt Gingrich from Democratic attacks" by producing a pro-Gingrich videotape.

Clinton begins his five-day European trip by visiting English prime minister, royalty

LONDON (AP) — After months of quiet tension, President Clinton and Prime Minister John Major swapped support Wednesday for the U.S.-brokered peace treaty in Bosnia and an unexpected breakthrough in Northern Ireland. "This time is full of possibility," Clinton said.



Opening a five-day European trip, Clinton paid a morning call on the British leader at 10 Downing Street, won long applause for a rousing speech to Parliament, and with his wife, Hillary, toured Buckingham Palace with Queen Elizabeth and Prince Philip.

Clinton sought to lay to rest old differences over Bosnia and Northern Ireland, comparing U.S.-British relations to the way that secret agent James Bond preferred his martinis. "Our relationship can never be stirred nor shaken," the president said in a dinner toast. "It will always be there. It will always be strong."

Warning of the dangers of isolationism, Clinton told Parliament members, "We must never go down that road again."

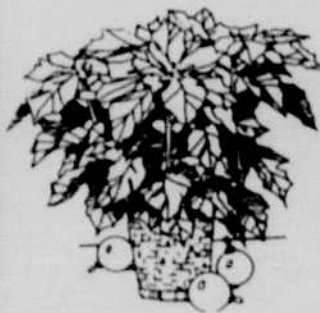
