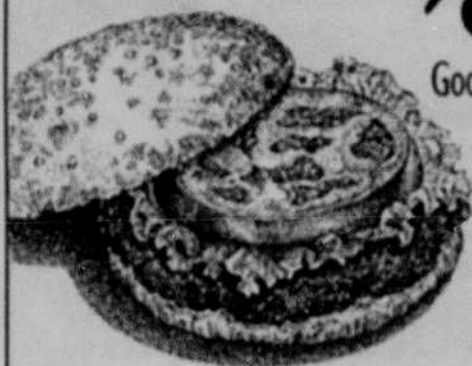

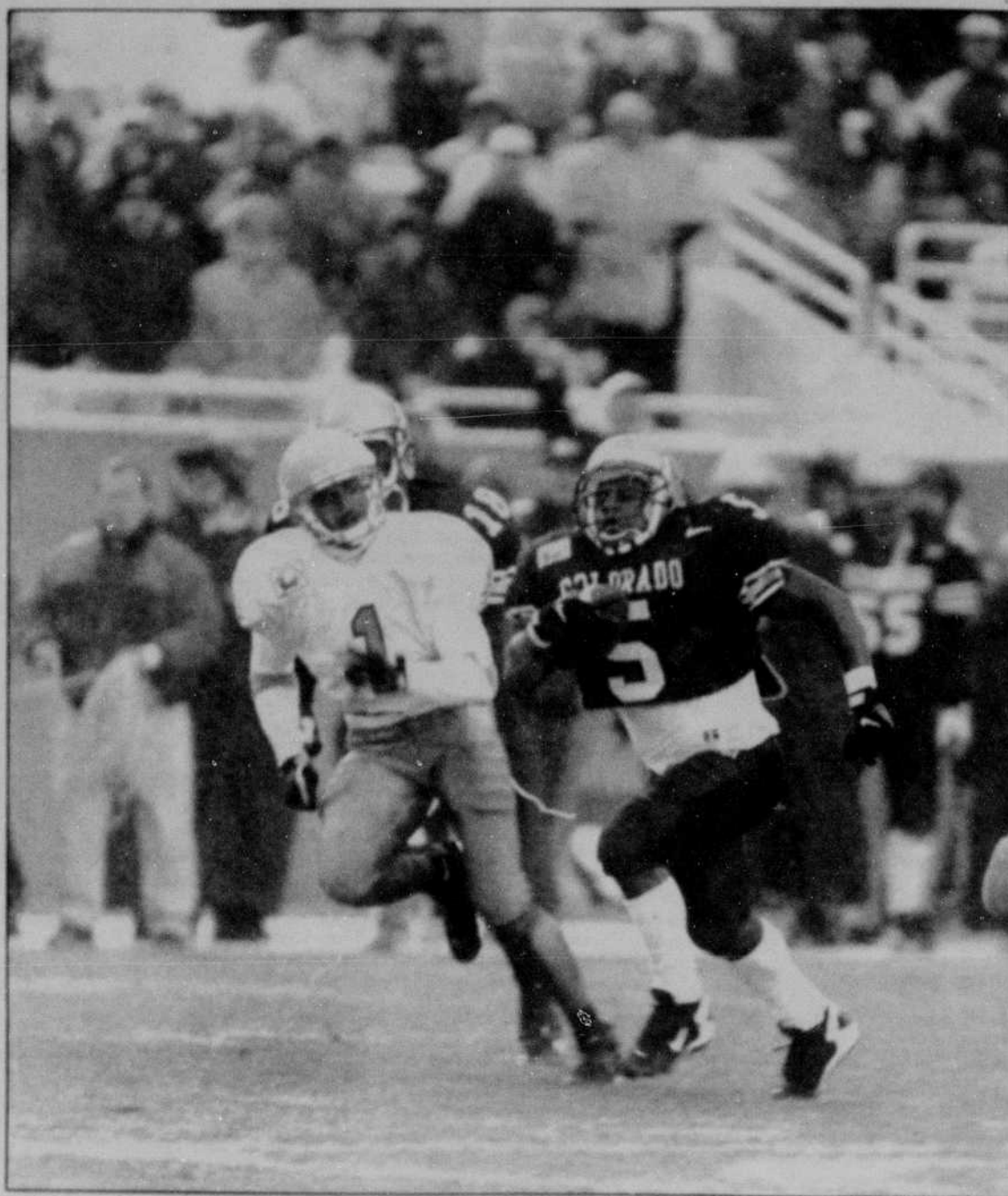

Football: Second quarter interception gives Colorado momentum needed to win

and out of synch the whole game, forcing five key turnovers in Colorado's 38-6 thrashing of the Oregon.

"We were sluggish in the first half, at least from an offensive standpoint, but the defense found a way to keep us in the game," Colorado coach Rick Neuheisel said. "Really, if you are just looking from an X and O's standpoint, the defense really dominated the game."

"We just turned the ball over too much," Oregon offensive coordinator Al Borges said. "We didn't capitalize on a few opportunities, but turnovers was the big thing. That is what hurt us earlier in the year, and that killed us today. We put our defense in too many bad situations."

The game started with a 63-yard kickoff return by senior tailback Ricky Whittle, but Colorado thwarted the effort by only allowing a 25-yard field goal from freshman kicker Joshua Smith.

And despite a 7-yard interception return from senior linebacker Rich Ruhl on Colorado's subsequent possession, Colorado's defense kept Oregon from scoring again, as the Ducks had to settle for another Smith field goal, making the score 6-0.

The Ducks forced another turnover on the Buffaloes' next possession, as senior linebacker Jeremy Asher forced Colorado's sophomore wide receiver Phil Savoy to fumble, giving the Ducks the ball at the Colorado 39-yard line.

But on the Ducks third play of the possession, junior quarterback Tony Graziani, looking for senior flanker Cristin McLemore, was picked off by junior free safety Steve Rosga, marking the first of the crucial Oregon turnovers.

When the first quarter came to a close, the Ducks only had 49 net yards compared to Colorado's 113 yards.

Down 7-6 early in the second quarter, the Ducks drove to the Colorado 9-yard line on their second possession of the quarter. The next play, however, gave the momentum to the Buffaloes and all but gave Colorado cornerback Marcus Washington the defensive player of the game award.

Under pressure from Colorado's pass rush, Graziani threw up an errant pass that hit Washington in the numbers, giving the redshirt freshman a 95-yard interception touchdown, the longest in Cotton Bowl history, and the Buffaloes a 13-6 lead.

More than the touchdown, however, the interception took the air out of Oregon's offense, and not even the halftime break could inflate it.

"The interception was a bad read," Graziani said. "The momentum changed, and it was possibly the play of the game."

Four plays into the third quarter, Colorado's sophomore quarterback John Hessler put the Buffaloes on top 20-7 with a pass to junior tight end Matt Lepis, and Colorado never looked back.

Graziani was hit hard on each of the Ducks' next two possessions, and both of the hits result-

ed in fumbles recovered by Colorado. Both of those recoveries resulted in Colorado touchdowns. The first was by sophomore tailback Herchell Troutman, who rushed for 100 yards and was named the offensive player of the game. The second was on a short pass from Hessler to Savoy.

The fourth quarter provided some fireworks, though none that resulted in an Oregon score.

With the score 32-6 and less than five minutes to play, Neuheisel called for a fake punt, and sophomore punter Andy Mitchell hit sophomore Ryan Black with a pass, giving the Buffaloes a first down and paving the way for their final touchdown.

That play created some bad blood between the two teams.

"I hated that there were hard feelings toward the end of the game," Neuheisel said. "We faked the punt at the four minute and whatever second juncture strictly because they were lined up to block the punt, and if you have been following Colorado football, we have had five of them blocked."

The Ducks finished the game with 267 total yards, while the Buffaloes had a season low 313 yards. For the second game in a row, the Ducks couldn't manage even one touchdown, and Colorado took advantage of almost every Oregon mistake.

"We did not play as well as we were capable of, unfortunately, and I give Colorado credit for taking advantage of our mistakes," Bellotti said.
