"It seems like everyone's complying fairly well with the rules," MacIntyre said.

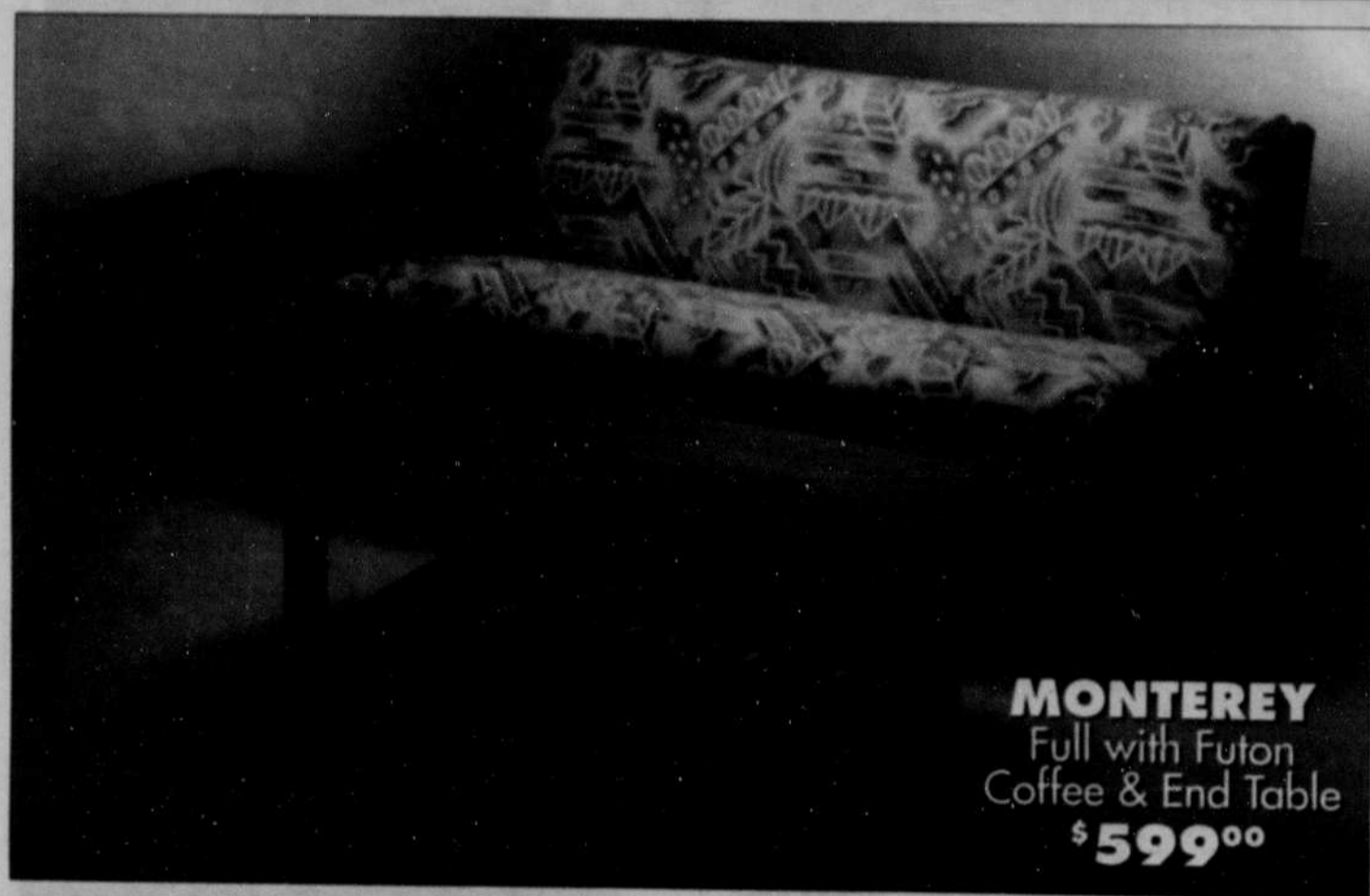
Six security guards were on scene to keep the situation under control. There were only a couple incidents of people sneaking beer into the party, MacIntyre said. He said security handled the problem.

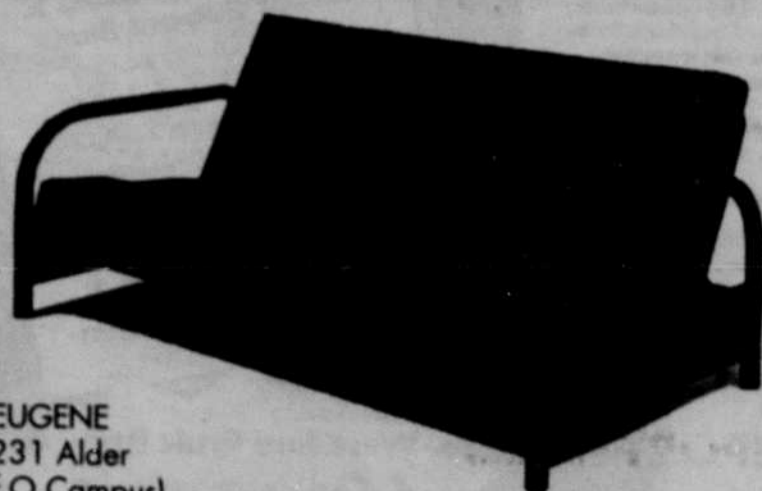

### POLICE BEAT
