Oregon weekend brings flooding, freezing rain

■ WEATHER: Icy conditions
cause traffic accidents
across the state

PORTLAND (AP) — From the ice-coated highways of northwestern Oregon to flooded homes in northeastern Oregon, weather created serious problems across the state on Sunday.

An overnight dose of freezing rain turned highways into ice rinks in the Willamette Valley from Eugene to Portland.

And in the northeastern Oregon town of Union, four homes and a church were flooded when an ice jam sent Catherine Creek flowing over its banks.

After nearly a week of sub-freezing temperatures, a storm system warmed things up. But the rain that the new system brought created big problems.

In Klamath Falls, the roof of a J.C. Penney store in the Klamath Mall collapsed Sunday morning. No one was injured because the mall wasn't yet open for business when the roof fell in shortly before 8 a.m.

The collapse occurred when rain fell on top of packed snow that was left over from earlier, colder storms.

Hundreds of traffic accidents occurred Saturday night and Sunday, but the problems were much less severe than they might have been because the storm hit on a weekend.

Oregon 99W was closed throughout the day Sunday after a tanker truck overturned shortly after 5 a.m. near Sherwood, spilling about 30 gallons of sodium hydrosulfite onto the roadway.

The truck contained about 5,000 gallons of the chemical, which can irritate the skin and impair breathing for those who are in close contact with it.

Tualatin Valley Fire & Rescue crews were waiting for chemical company representatives to arrive to remove the rest of the material before the truck was moved, spokeswoman Karen Eubanks said.

Driving was treacherous along Interstate 5 between Eugene and Portland. At the Wilsonville exits south of Portland, several trucks slid out of control, blocking the roadway.

A truck driver who gave his name only as Jeremy said about 8:30 a.m. that he'd been waiting for 5 1/2 hours for a tow truck.

"The tow trucks that are supposed to help us are across the freeway pulling those trucks out now," he said.

In Union, population 1,900, an ice jam some 2,000 feet long blocked the creek that runs through the town.

Four houses and the town's Catholic Church flooded Saturday night and another 12 houses were threatened, city administrator Leonard Almquist said. Thirty soldiers from the Oregon National Guard and 10 Union County Jail inmates were called in to help townspeople put sandbags around the threatened homes.

"I'd say there are probably 2 or 3 feet of water around the houses," Almquist said.

Almquist said old-timers in the town could not remember any time when flooding was so severe.

The water was backing into irrigation ditches, spreading the flood water through the western part of town.

The National Weather Service issued a flash flood watch for Union, Umatilla, Morrow and Grant counties because of fears that ice jams would break, sending large amounts of water rushing downstream.

Environmental movement making comeback, leaders say

■ CONFERENCE: Recent polls indicate the majority of Americans oppose weakening environmental laws; environmentalists urge increased political involvement

ASHLAND (AP) — The environmental movement is making a comeback and needs to become more involved in politics, two environmentalist leaders say.

Former U.S. Rep. Jim Jontz, director of the Western Ancient Forest Campaign in Washington, D.C., told a weekend conference of environmentalists that the opportunity exists to change the debate on forest health as well as repair the "salvage rider" that suspended environmental laws on certain Northwest timber sales.

"I think we ought to make the White House feel a lot more pain," Jontz said. "This is President Clinton's forest rider. He signed it into law. He knew better — or perhaps he got some bad advice."

The three-day conference, which ended Sunday, took place at Southern Oregon State College and sponsored by the Headwaters environmental group.

Andy Kerr, head of the Oregon Natural Resources Council, joined Jontz in saying environmentalists welcome participation of evangelical Christians in the movement.

Environmentalists have suffered several political setbacks since Republicans gained control of Congress two years ago.

"Any good social movement goes through periodic death and, hopefully, resurrection," Kerr said. "That is what the environmental movement is doing." Kerr urged the 300 people attending the conference to become more political.

"We need to realize that democracy is a body contact sport," he said. "But 80 percent of it is who shows up. And the other side has been showing up more than we have. We have not been fielding a team lately."

He said part of the credit for Democrat Ron Wyden's victory over Republican Gordon Smith in the Oregon Senate race should go to environmentalists.
