was the right decision.

"If someone rejects a decision that I think is right, I'm not going to cry about it."
In reality, Kansas City wasn't offering O'Neil the third-string quarterback job. They weren't even offering him an official tryout to get that job. They were offering him the chance to work out with the team and impress some people, something they had already had him do a few months earlier.

"It wasn't like they were giving me a dream shot," O'Neil said. "They were giving me a shot in the dark. I don't need shots in the dark. I would love to play in the NFL, but I'm not living my life to do that."

Cool-headed decisions like that, Romaine said, come to O'Neil naturally.

"He has a good sense of common sense and responsibility," Romaine said. "They came after him, but he isn't even slightly interested, which seems to blow everybody's mind."

But when the Piranhas came calling — not demanding (a big difference, O'Neil points out — a unique opportunity arose. O'Neil was the guy they wanted, and they wanted to accommodate him as much as possible.

"I was aware of him as a player," said Ian Welsh, the director of player personnel for the Piranhas. "After I watched his film, I got excited."

Likewise, Piranhas head coach Babe Parilli liked what he saw in O'Neil.

"[Parilli] knows quarterbacks as well as any-

one, and he really likes what he sees in Danny," Welsh said.

Because the team practices in the morning and plays games on the weekends, O'Neil's duties at Calvary would not be jeopardized by the opportunity.

"It was an opportunity where I wouldn't have to sacrifice my position at Calvary," O'Neil said. "That was not going to be a negotiable factor."

"The main sticking points were not over money, but that he could fulfill his duties at Calvary Chapel," Welsh said, adding that some games are played on Fridays. "There are other things, but we can work them out."

"He knows what he wants to do, and this is the only place that would fit."

And when you combine O'Neil's name recognition with the fact that the Piranhas, who used to be the Las Vegas Sting, are in only their first year in California, Welsh saw a perfect opportunity for both sides.

"He is a local hero," Welsh said. "He is one of the more recognizable names in Orange County. And it gives him a platform to do other things ... be a positive impact."

"I know we got a good guy."

And the motives for O'Neil's resurgence to football aren't what many people might think.

"I'm not playing Arena football to get a shot," he said. "I will definitely take it as a time to enjoy myself. I hope it will be a blast, and that I will have fun with it."

But that doesn't mean O'Neil won't go all out for the Piranhas. In Arena football, the 50-yard field and the fact that passes can be played off of the walls is ideal for a quarterback.

"For a quarterback, this is the place to be," Welsh said. "It worked out perfectly."

It was under O'Neil's tutelage that the Oregon football team went to the Rose Bowl for the first time in 37 years. But after four years of putting football first, O'Neil has made religion and teaching his top-ranked priorities. He has made the transition from the pigskin to the pulpit.

According to Romaine, it takes a special type of person to meet a pastor's job description.

"One who cares about the people, one who goes the extra mile," Romaine said of the qualities of a pastor. Apparently, O'Neil already has them.

"He will make a fabulous pastor," he added. And a great Arena football player, to boot.
