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Women: Ducks looking to avenge USC loss

The Ducks have had five days to think about the loss to USC and will attempt to right the ship tonight at Mac Court against Washington. The Huskies are one of three teams tied for second in the Pac-10 at 6-3. Washington was shocked by then-winless Arizona State last Saturday after winning two straight games. In the unofficial beginning to the second half of the Pac-10 season, Oregon will know what Washington is bringing to the table.

"I think the big thing for the Washington schools is that we get to play them at home," Runge said. "We had a look at them and we have a better feel for what they're going to do. We don't expect them to make a lot of changes."

The two teams last met Jan. 13 in Seattle, when the Huskies dominated the Ducks 82-66 for Oregon's third conference loss of the year. All five Washington starters scored in double figures, led by sophomore Gena Pelz at 19 points.

Senior center Renae Fegent notched her season-best for the Ducks with 26 points while junior guard Cindie Edamura and freshman forward Sonja Curtis had then-career highs of 16 and 11 points, respectively. The Huskies beat out Oregon by shooting .508, making them the

Ducks' only opponent to shoot above .500 against Oregon all season.

Oregon was forced to play the Washington game without Arianne Boyer, the Ducks' scoring and rebounding leader. Boyer was suspended from the team and sent back to Eugene early after "a difference in opinions" following the loss to Washington State.

Freshman Jamie Redd leads Washington in scoring going into tonight's game, averaging 15.3 points per game. She joins two other Huskies averaging in double figures, junior Laure Savasta (13.7) and Pelz (10.5). One of the conference's highest-scoring teams, Washington has put up more than 72 points while shooting better than .400. The Huskies also lead the Pac-10 in three-pointers, with Redd and senior Shannon Kelly hitting 27 and 23 apiece.

In the morose post-game locker room after the USC loss, Runge said the effort just wasn't there on the part of the Ducks. Unlike against UCLA, she said few players were diving for loose balls or hustling to rebound positions.

"I don't know what it is we can do to ensure that doesn't happen again," Runge said. "This team has to understand that winning is crucial and the teams above us in the standings are going to con-

back and running back that had 595 yards on 70 carries last year.

The Skyline signees are just two of a few incoming freshmen who could see significant time next year. The Ducks signed two safeties in junior college transfer LuShawn Brown and Alaska native Dietrich Moore, and two defensive backs in Gary Barker and Tamoni Joiner. Because Oregon lost five players from its secondary, the four have a good chance of seeing some playing time in their true freshman year.

"Because of the lack of the numbers of total scholarships and the ability of some of these young men, I foresee us taking the alternate approach of saying let's bring everybody in with the intent that they are going to play, and then those that are not physically or mentally ready in terms of maturity, we will red-shirt them," Bellotti said.

"The policy has always been in the past that we would prefer that every freshman redshirt his first year," he said. "But I am not going to assume that we are going to redshirt a freshman. Right now I am going to make the assumption ... that each freshman has the opportunity to play."

Penn State nabs nation's top recruiting class

(AP) — After all these years, kids still love Joe Paterno.

The Penn State coach used the right words at the right time and the results made the Nittany Lions big winners on national signing day.

"Kids are always impressed with him, because he shows so much interest in them when they meet," says Allen Wallace, publisher of SuperPrep magazine in Laguna Beach, Calif.

Unlike last year, when Penn State lost the quarterback it craved in Dan Kendra, the Lions snared highly touted Rashard Casey of Hoboken, N.J., on Wednesday. Add versatile running backs Joe Dawkins of Hackensack, N.J., and Ken Watson of Harrisburg, Pa., plus the usual lot of promising linebackers and Paterno's incoming group surpassed national cham-

pion Nebraska for the strongest recruiting class.

"The edge goes to Penn State, because they have the best quarterback," Wallace said. "Casey is a guy who can get it done on the ground and through the air. He makes the difference for Penn State."

Casey was rated the No. 2 quarterback by SuperPrep, just behind Tim Couch, a 6-foot-5, 215-pounder from Hyden, Ky., who signed with Kentucky.

The Cornhuskers signed only 18 players — their smallest class since 1984 — but they were doozies, including SuperPrep's top defensive back, Mike Brown (5-11, 195) of Scottsdale, Ariz., and coverman Ralph Brown (5-11, 180) of California's La Puente Bishop Amat HS. Both were expected to sign with Southern California.

Florida State, which grabbed SuperPrep's top running back, Laveranues Coles (6-1, 195) of Jacksonville, Fla., was third, followed by USC, Notre Dame, Ohio State, Michigan, Tennessee, Colorado and LSU.
