Anti-hate activists to rally Sunday in Southern Oregon

GRANTS PASS (AP) — Activists plan a rally Sunday to mark the one-year anniversary of a demonstration against white supremacists.

The original event was organized in response to reports that Idaho's Aryan Nations was establishing a presence in southern Oregon.

Barry Snitkin, co-chairman of the Josephine Human Rights Alliance, said white supremacist organizing efforts appeared to have ended.

"It's been quiet," he said. "We haven't seen anything but that doesn't mean they've gone away. We're cautious."

Three wounded as gun discharges at mall

PORTLAND (AP) — Police are searching for a man who carried a .410-gauge shotgun into a suburban mall, where it discharged, wounding three people.

Sheriff's investigators said the weapon was fired into the floor. Pellets hit two women and a man in the legs. All three suffered only minor wounds.

The suspect ran out of the Clackamas Town Center and into some nearby apartments, investigators said. The mall was crowded with shoppers when the incident occurred Saturday night.

Plane, pilot missing in Estacada area

ESTACADA (AP) — A search Sunday failed to turn up a twin-engine courier plane believed downed in the Estacada area.

Despite the addition of a ground team, searchers had failed to spot any wreckage as weather conditions threatened to force an end to Sunday's efforts.



Investigation focuses on high train speed

SILVER SPRING, Md. (AP) — Investigators picked through mangled wreckage Sunday to determine why a commuter train was moving more than twice as fast as it should have been just before slamming into an Amtrak passenger liner. Eleven people died in the ensuing fireball.

Evidence turned up so far appears to point toward error by the engineer of the MARC commuter train, said John Goglia, a member of the National Transportation Safety Board who is heading the investigation.

"It's far too early for us to come to a conclusion ... but based on the facts, we are moving in that direction," Goglia told reporters after the second full day of the federal investigation into Friday's deadly collision just outside the city limits of the nation's capital.

Investigators found no mechanical problems with either train and the signal system is in working order, though more tests are needed to determine whether it was operating Friday night at the time of the crash, Goglia said.

"To date, with about 50 percent of the testing done, we can find nothing wrong with the signals," he said.

Investigators want to determine whether a yellow caution light was on to warn the MARC train to slow to 30 mph after it left the Kensington, Md., station a few miles from the crash site. They said it was clocked at 63 mph before the engineer applied emergency brakes in a futile attempt to avoid the collision.

"We haven't determined yet if the Kensington signal was yellow at the time ... but now when we test that circuit the light turns yellow," Goglia said.



Phillipines ferry capsizes, 32 confirmed dead

BACOLOD CITY, Philippines (AP) — An overloaded wooden ferry capsized when strong waves caused it to sway and panicked passengers ran to one side, officials said Monday. At least 32 people were confirmed dead.

The Coast Guard said 126 people, many of them children, had been rescued and 14 more were missing. At least 21 of the dead were children.

The vessel was approaching Cadiz, 300 miles southeast of Manila, in Negros from Bantayan Island in Cebu province when the accident occurred Sunday evening, the Coast Guard said.

The ferry had been ordered out of service last week by the Maritime Industry Authority for being unseaworthy, Coast Guard official Edmund Tan said. It was not clear whether it had received permission to resume operations.

Car bombs kill 12, wound 35 in Algeria at end of Ramadan

ALGIERS, Algeria (AP) — Two car bombs exploded Sunday night, killing 12 people and wounding 35 others celebrating the end of the Muslim holy month of Ramadan, hospital officials and witnesses said.

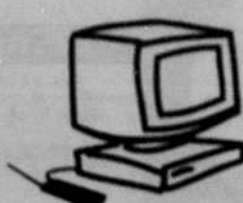
The bombs exploded around 6:30 p.m. (12:30 p.m. EST) in Ain Nadja just south of the capital, Algiers, and in Ain Taya to the east. Hospital officials said 17 of the wounded were seriously hurt.

No one immediately claimed responsibility for the attacks. But suspicion fell on violent militants who have been fighting to overthrow Algeria's military-backed government and install strict Islamic rule.

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
