## Budget: Schools must to absorb shock of Measure 5

loss, resulting in numerous program cuts.

In this first round, many schools were forced to close departments and increase their class sizes, said Weldon Ihrig, OSSHE vice chancellor of finance and administration.

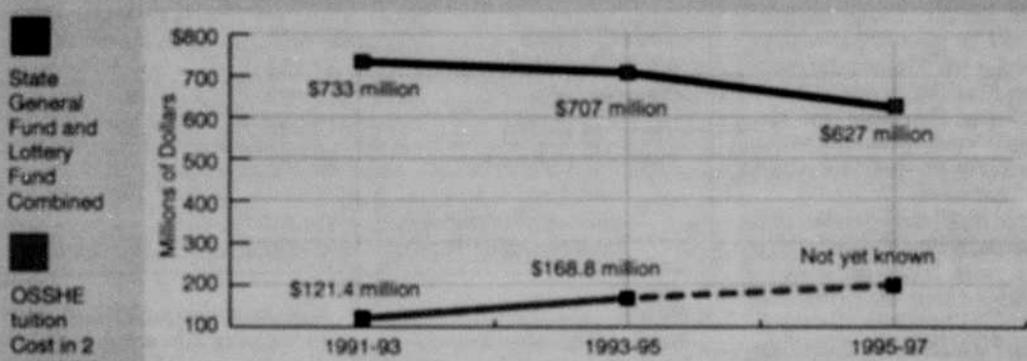
"In 1991, we [the University] were forced to close academic programs to make up for the loss due to Ballot Measure 5," said Pamela Daener, associate vice provost for research management. "We eliminated the College of Human Development and Performance, as well as gerontology and training for physical education."

The second phase, the 1993-95 biennium, created another revenue loss. But the schools found alternate ways to absorb the shock from the budget crisis, such as enrolling more out-of-state students to make up for the loss.

In the third and current phase of Measure 5, the 1995-97 biennium, schools continue to

implement cost-effective measures to deal with loss in-state funding. This phase will be more vertical, Ihrig said, adding that the state will not replace people who retire and will offer

early retirement as an inducement to saving the system money.

In 1991, the University received \$45 million in state appropriation and \$35 million in tuition, Daener said. In 1995,

the University received \$42 million in appropriations, but tuition jumped to \$75 million.

"Now students have fewer choices and are paying a whole lot more for their education," Daener said.

## Food stamp eligibility changed to help Oregon flood victims

**HELP:** Some Oregonians will qualify for monetary reimbursement for flood-related expenses

A Disaster Food Stamp Program will begin today and run through Friday to provide assistance to low-income flood victims in Oregon.

Typical eligibility standards for food stamps will be changed to assist Oregonians who suffered unreimbursed disaster-related expenses, including the loss or interruption of work, according to a news release.

Eligible households will receive one-half of one month's food stamp benefits.

Applicants must have lived in one of the 18 disaster-declared counties, which include Benton, Lane, Lincoln and Linn counties, at the time of flooding.

Social security numbers for all household members and photo identification must be shown. Applicants should also be prepared to furnish proof of disaster-related losses, income and savings accounts.

Food stamp benefits are based on the following household and income limits: one person at \$623 net income would receive \$60 of benefits; two people at \$836 net income would receive \$109 of benefits; three

people at \$1,050 net income would receive \$157 of benefits; and four people at \$1,263 net income would receive \$199 of benefits.

Households must meet the net income requirements for February after unreimbursed disaster-related expenses have been deducted. Also, households that have more than \$2,000 in cash or savings accounts are not eligible for benefits.

Adult and Family Services will issue the disaster food stamps for Lane County in the Springfield AFS building at 1040 Harlow Rd. and the Florence AFS building at 3180 Highway 101.

### POLICE BEAT

A University student reported to police on Feb. 11 that \$100 was allegedly stolen from him by a female escort. The woman came to the student's apartment at 565 E. 19th Ave. and allegedly received \$100 from the student.

The student said the woman asked him, "What do you want?" and, "Do you want to have sex?" The man said, "yes," and the woman said she had to go back to her car to put the money away for safekeeping. Ten minutes later, realizing that the woman was not coming back, the student called the escort service.

The student told police he paid for the woman's company and a possible striptease. The student also said he wanted to report the incident because he didn't want the same thing to happen to other people.

A resident at 1750 Alder St. was lodged in jail for excessive noise last Saturday. Police responded to a complaint about loud music at the resident's apartment, and the resident was issued a \$750 ticket for aggravated prohibited noise.

Authorities told the resident that if they came back to his apartment again, he would be placed under arrest. Police received a second complaint an hour and half later and arrested the man.

A University student received a series of harassing phone calls last Saturday from a suspect identifying himself as a football player, Ron Goldman and an AT&T operator. The suspect, who also said he was a member of the Aryan Nations, allegedly called the student a "faggot" and threatened to kill him.

About 20 people were involved in a melee at 1543 Ferry St. on Sunday. Police reports said all the combatants were intoxicated when interviewed about the incident and at least two people were treated for mild injuries.

The incident started when a 21-year-old man began allegedly punching a fence at the house, according to police reports. The man said he had a disagreement with his girlfriend and was taking his frustration out on the fence. One of the residents at the house confronted the man and the two began fighting. The man's friends and the resident's roommates rushed outside and the fighting quickly escalated between the two groups. Neither party wanted to press charges.

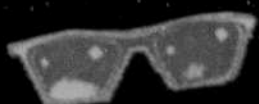
