Women's B-ball: Trojans looking to go to tourney

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Thompson was fouled by Renae Fegent with four seconds remaining in regulation. Thompson tied the game with a foul shot, and USC cruised to an easy victory in overtime. Oregon couldn't find the net in the final frame, scoring just two points while the Trojans rattled off 9-of-12 from the foul line en route to victory.

USC used the zone defense in its win earlier this month. Oregon's last four opponents have gone with the zone to exploit the Ducks' outside shooting deficiencies. Runge knows that USC will probably throw the zone at Oregon tonight.

"We need to find someone to shoot it from the outside this weekend, whether it's Sonja Curtis, Lisa Bowyer, Cindie Edamura or Betty Ann Boeving," she said. "They've got to start stepping up and putting the ball in the basket."

USC has lost two straight, including a 16-point loss to UCLA in their last game on Saturday. Only two players — Thompson and Erica Mashia — scored more than four points in the game.

In desperate need of some wins to solidify their bid to the Tournament, the Trojans will rely on Thompson and Mashia to carry the team tonight. Thompson is the go-to player for USC, averaging 22.9 points and 9.8 rebounds, while Mashia chips in 11 points and 3.2 assists per game.

"USC is going to be trying to get back on the winning track and into the NCAA Tournament," Runge said. "They're playing well, better than they did in the first half of the season. They have some confidence in having won in overtime at our place. They will be a tough team to beat at this stage of the season."
