PFC denies club 225 percent increase

■ **FUNDING:** Accused of misusing fees, the Hawaii Club settles for a 14.8 percent boost

The ASUO Programs Finance Committee (PFC) convened Thursday night in the EMU Cedar Rooms to approve five 1996-97 budgets.

The PFC committee allocated \$2,325 to the Hawaii Club, which is a 14.8 percent increase. The committee denied the group's original request for a 225.28 percent increase because 1996-97 will only be the second year the group has been recognized on campus.

"My concern is you've only been around, that is we've only funded you, for one year," PFC member Shamus Lynsky said. "To increase your budget with that track record really alarms me."

The committee said they found various ways the club inappropriately used student fees, including money to go to Sunriver and to participate in Recreational and Intramural sporting events.

"As far as we're concerned, that's a blatant misuse of student fees," PFC chairwoman Susan Anderson said. "It's appalling."

Kelly Sunada, Hawaii Club member and ASUO head controller, said she was unaware of

these restrictions.

In other business, the committee granted \$1,306 to Students for Choice, for an increase of 14.3 percent. Originally the group requested a 67 percent increase, most of which would have gone toward an increase in the co-directors' stipends.

"These people are doing a lot of work," said one of last year's Students for Choice co-directors, Mandi Hood. "They deserve a little bit of an increase. Someone should have a heart."

The PFC, however, said they had avoided stipend increases in previous hearings and would continue to do so.

Earlier in the evening approximately 30 men, women and chil-

dren sat in on hearing proceedings to support the Amazon Co-op Family Center. The center received its budget as requested for \$32,289, a 5.03 percent increase. The center had originally asked for \$92,160, but lowered the request for Thursday's meeting.

However Suzy Blanchard, the center's director, said she would work to get the remaining balance on the University spring ballot.

"The reason I handed you this new budget tonight is that it's very clear to me you don't have the money," she said.

Mediation received \$35,421, a 5.17 increase, and the Vietnamese Students Association received \$3,572, for an increase of 8.2 percent.

not justified because of poor management of funds in the past and the need for additional parking at the University.

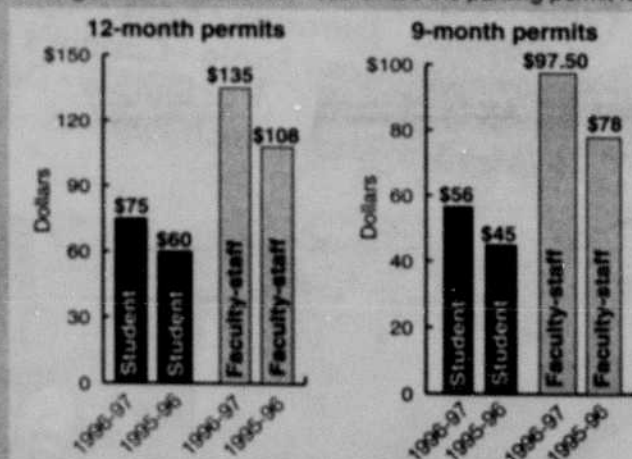
"We question the justification for a fee increase based on the need to balance the parking budget when revenues from the previous fee increase have not been used to increase or improve parking facilities," she said.

Davis also questioned the difference in cost for faculty and student permits. Faculty and staff pay an extra \$69 for a 12-month permit, but have access to all of the lots on campus.

"What we're trying to do is make it more equitable," Davis said. "If you want to park, pay the fee."
