**Standards upgraded for election**

All candidates for the upcoming spring election who currently work in the ASUO Executive will be faced with new, more strict campaign guidelines.

In a meeting on March 5, members of the Executive determined election activities and job requirements to be entirely exclusive of each other.

Candidates must maintain all their office hours and other duties while keeping all campaign material and discussion outside of the ASUO office.

While state law allows candidates to have election material under their desk and on their person, ASUO president Jennifer Williamson and vice-president Zachary Kelton have set higher standards for their office.

"We're severely cracking down on people breaking the rules," Williamson said.

Williamson hopes by setting such strict rules early on, it will prevent problems later in the process.

"I'm hoping to kill all conflict before it happens," she said.

The University used money from the parking fund to loan money to Intercollegiate Athletics and used \$400,000 to purchase the Rainier building which is used by telecommunications. The Rainier loan has been repaid and the athletic loan is being repaid in two installments.

"They shouldn't be raising fees when the transportation study isn't even complete," Harrsch said. "It seems like they're putting the horse before the cart."

"According to OAR 352.360, fees can only be based on the costs of maintaining, operating and constructing parking facilities. This is not supposed to be a revenue-raising charge."

According to Williams, there is nothing that says that the money from the parking fund can't be used in other areas.

"It says that only parking funds, and not any

state funds, can be used to maintain the parking facilities," Williams said. "Parking is a reserve account and it's not uncommon to use reserve accounts to advance money for other areas."

Parking problems will not be solved by the increase in parking fees, Hicks said.

"We should be out of this deficit within two years," he said. "After that we will look at trying to add more spaces."

One suggested option to relieve the problem of on-campus parking is to put a cap on the number of permits sold. Currently there are nearly three times as many permits sold as there are spaces, Harrsch said.

"When you pay for a permit, you buying a permit to look for a spot," Harrsch said. "It's just like a hunting license. You aren't guaranteed anything."
