Student home pages gain popularity

■ **INTERNET:** Attempts to censor don't look likely to hinder Web access

More and more, students are designing and producing Internet home pages as a way to communicate who they are and what they like.

"It's hard to say how many students have home pages," said Bjorn Petterson, a graduate teaching fellow in computer and information science. "I personally have helped 15 or 20 individuals create one."

Petterson said he believes home pages are the wave of the future, but they are also trendy.

"People want one because everyone else has one," he said.

It's customary to include your e-mail address in the name of your home page, to tell people something about yourself, what your interests are and so on. It's like keeping up with the Joneses, he said.

Petterson, who grew up in Norway, said he has been working with computers since he was 12 and knows a good deal about computer programming.

Petterson also said regulating the Internet may be difficult, and he doesn't see much use in vague laws that censor the Internet.

"It doesn't seem logical to have rules for contact media," he said. "And the laws that have passed lately are so ludicrous because the lawmakers don't know what the Internet really is."

Lawmakers contend that the Internet needs to be regulated to

protect children from adult material available on the medium.

"None of us is in favor of pornography," said Sen. Patrick Leahy, D-Vt. "But we can accomplish the goal of keeping pornography away from children without imposing a big new layer of government censorship and without destroying the Internet."

Opponents argue that measures to censor information on the Internet, which is a global medium, fall outside the realm of U.S. jurisdiction.

Civil-rights activists said such laws, if passed, would be tied down in litigation for years.

Personal home pages don't usually break any laws because they normally only contain biographical information about their creators, Petterson said.

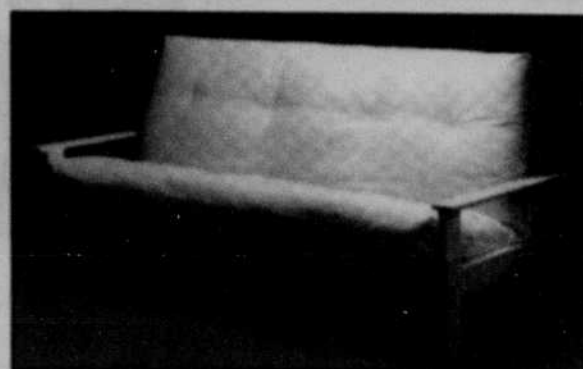

testing sessions to minority-group members, instead of charging them the usual \$45 to \$60 registration fee.

MEChA members are also working to encourage members of the local Hispanic community to become potential donors. Ramiro Flores, a member of MEChA, said he is hoping the donor drive will raise student awareness.

"I think this is a first step," he said. "I think we somehow feel removed from it all when we give blood. We don't realize where it is going or what it can do to help someone."

Flores said it is important for people to become members of the national registry because this one-time action can have positive effects at any time.

"I don't know if [this drive] will help Sam, but it could help another person's life," he said.

After a match is found for a patient like Mobley, the actual donation can occur. This process takes about two hours and leaves the donor sore for about a week. The donor's marrow will replenish itself in a few weeks, and in a few years the patient's blood type will have changed to that of the donor's.

"The person will be sore for a week or so, but then they have given someone else another chance," Johnson said.
