

Conference: Students learn about detectability of photo-manipulation

University journalism Professor Tom Wheeler, and "Putting Your Publication on the World Wide Web," hosted by Mick Westrick, director of instructional technology services in the school of journalism and communication.

During his presentation, Wheeler used slides to show examples of photo manipulation.

"We're here today to talk about ethics," Wheeler said. "And, as with all other questions, people disagree on what is acceptable and what is not."

Wheeler showed slides of a pregnant Bruce Willis, a paint-by-numbers Madonna, and other images that were considered "photo-illustrations."

After showing the photo of Hillary in the leather bikini, Wheeler asked the students how the photographers got Hillary to pose for the photo. Most students knew that the photo was not real.

The same was true for the pregnant Bruce Willis.

Often these issues aren't as clear cut, Wheeler said.

"As photo manipulation gets easier and less detectable, many people are going to take these images at face value and not know that they are photo-illustrations," he said.

Wheeler also displayed two identical photos of O. J. Simpson and asked what was wrong with them.

"One of the photos makes it seem like he might be innocent," one student said. "The other one makes him look guilty."

The "guilty" photo was darkened and made to look as if Simpson were already behind bars. "He looks like he did it," Wheeler said.

"The main goal of this conference is to promote high school journalism," said Greg Kerber, assistant dean of the University's journalism school. "At the same time, it introduces the students to higher education. It's something tangible for a 15- to 16-year-old."

Mac Court will be open. The Academic Counseling Center and Esslinger Hall will remain open.

The closure of Mac Court will affect several University events.

The commencement ceremony is usually held in Mac Court when it rains. No alternatives have been developed for accommodating the 10,000 expected graduates and spectators, Fritz said.

"Some have suggested, in jest, issuing commemorative umbrellas," he said.

The project will also force the relocation of some summer sports camps. Several big track meets are expected to create traffic problems around the construction site.

"We might open University Street for certain weekend events," Fritz said. "But that option is far from definite."

The decision to invest in reroofing Mac Court followed an engineering study conducted last fall on the structural integrity of the roof.

Although the big trusses are currently in good condition, the University decided the best long-term solution was to remove the whole roof structure and replace it with a new non-combustible steel joint system.

"I am well aware that the roof replacement will disrupt a number of University activities during the several months of construction," said Dan Williams, vice president for administration. "But, in my judgment, avoiding the risk of permanent damage to the facility more than offsets the inconveniences created by beginning the work this spring."
