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Budget: Offices across country will be closed

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The Federal government is cutting funding to small categorical programs that are not meeting the needs of all students, said Emilio Hernandez, Jr., director of the HEP program at the University.

But Hernandez does not see that as the goal of the program.

"We're not supposed to meet the needs of all students," Hernandez said. "We are supposed to be meeting the needs of the migrant and seasonal farm-working students that are being left out."

About 22 HEP offices around the country will be closed. Other programs, such as Upward Bound, which also works with Chicano students, are expected to accommodate the groups of students that are currently taught by HEP.

"Programs like Upward Bound don't target the same groups that we do," Hernandez said. "They are working with stabilized students that have a permanent address and may be flunking but are still in school."

HEP finds its students through the Migrant Education referral system after they have dropped out of the public school system.

"We try to catch these students before they leave the area or decide to do farm work full time," Hernandez said.

HEP's entire budget is provided by the federal government, Hernandez said. The Department of Education approved 95 percent of last year's budget, and the Migrant Education Program, which addresses the needs of migrant students, will provide the remaining 5 percent needed to operate the program next year, he said.

The program does not receive University funding and none of the students pay tuition because they all fall below the poverty line, Hernandez said.

"We're being set up for failure," he said.

Directors from HEP offices across the country are meeting April 13 in Houston to give a testimony to the National Migrant Council and other government representatives.

"We have one year to educate the government and show them that we are needed," Hernandez said. "Now is not the time to be eliminating options in education."

The day kicked off with a press conference, which included student speakers and a keynote address by Massachusetts Senator Ted Kennedy. From there, students broke off into smaller groups to meet with some of the politicians and their staff.

"There were 300 students representing all regions of the country," Scotten said. "Everybody had a real upbeat feel. It was great to see so many active students."

Scotten said he focused on student aid throughout Lobby Day events.

"Higher education is 1.8 percent of the budget," he said. "I don't see how you can justify \$14 billion in cuts. We need to look to cut larger programs first. Wyden's staff person was very supportive."

The USSA delegates hope to sponsor forums and to meet with various campus groups who might be interested in learning more about the issues discussed during the conference, Scotten said. One of the current plans, he said, is to organize residence hall programs in order to involve more students.

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
