Passover Seder to be honored tonight

■ **RELIGION:** The annual event celebrates the Jews' exodus from Egypt two thousand years ago

Passover Seder, an annual dinner to celebrate the Jewish holiday, will take place tonight in the Gerlinger Lounge at 6 o'clock.

Hillel, a Jewish community group, is sponsoring the traditional event. Programming President Sarah Rosenberg said Jews usually eat the dinner on the first two nights of Passover, an eight-day celebration of an event in Jewish history.

"It's a real family-based holiday," she said. "A lot of students go home for this."

The dinner will be open to all students for a \$7 fee and will run about two and a half hours. Between the many courses of the meal, services and readings will be recited by local religious leaders and students.

In a traditional Jewish household, however, the event typically runs as late as 1 a.m., said Hillel President Sam Gechter.

"[Seder] is a very ritualistic festival meal," he said. "It all relates to the story of the exodus."

Passover celebrates the Jews' escape from Egypt over two thousand years ago, as documented in the Torah or Old Testament of the Bible.

According to the story, the Jewish people were so rushed to leave, they had to take their bread out of the oven before it

had risen. Consequently, Jews now eat only unleavened bread in the annual celebration.

The holiday today, however, means much more than just a struggle by Jews a few millenniums ago, Rosenberg said.

Metaphorically, that struggle is like the many ordeals Jews have had to go through in the last century and in the last few years, she said.

"It is not just our ancestors, but it is something we've all gone through," she said.

Rosenberg said Passover will always remain as contemporary and as important as it ever was.

"We definitely incorporate it into our lives today," she said. "It's how we've attained our roots."

Teen brothers face hate crime charges for blowgun attack

POMPANO BEACH, Fla. (AP) — Two white teen-age brothers are accused of using a blowgun to shoot blacks with 3-inch metal darts while cruising around in their mother's Mercedes.

Jason Kovalcin, 18, and Andrew Kovalcin, 16, face hate-crime and other charges, said police spokeswoman Sandra King.

The brothers and another teen-ager, Christian Heinsler, were arrested Saturday after Jason allegedly used a blowgun to shoot 54-year-old Edward

Chapman in the back as he rode a bicycle. A fourth teen-ager in their car was not charged.

One of the teens told investigators that the four friends left the Kovalcins' Fort Lauderdale home earlier that evening with the intent of "going out and shooting some niggers," King said.

One of the teens also told investigators of an attack on another black man earlier that night in Fort Lauderdale, but no charges have been filed there.

Fort Lauderdale police Detective Clinton Ward said he was not aware of the incident.

The brothers were charged with aggravated battery with an additional allegation of hate crime, King said. They also face concealed weapons charges alleging that police found a hunting knife and hard plastic knuckles.

Jason was released Sunday on \$1,200 bail. Andrew, who was also charged with driving with a fake driver's license, remained in custody pending a judge's decision on whether he should be tried as an adult.

Heinsler, 18, was charged with possession of marijuana and a fake driver's license. He was released on \$1,000 bail.
