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Men's track: Sprinting crew excels

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Andrews won the 1,500-meter run in dramatic fashion, as he led the race nearly the whole way, finishing with a time of 3:48.05. As Andrews crossed the finish line, he opened his arms just as he got a push from Stanford's Jason Lunn, who was right on his heels.

"It was a good race — there were more people at the end than I thought there would be," Andrews said, adding that he was trying to edge Lunn into the next lane at the end. "I guess I inadvertently slowed up right before him — he was going to fall into me so I got a push across the line. It was fine with me."

Despite the strong outing the

Ducks' distance crew had, Oregon's sprinting crew was not completely out of the picture. Juniors Patrick Khoo and Kuni Arita and senior Damien Smith provided much-needed points for the Ducks, with Khoo placing third in the 100-meter dash and second in the 200 and Arita and Smith placing 1-2 in the 400-meter dash.

"We got some points where we knew we would get them and picked up some points where we knew it would be close, and we won the meet," Dellinger said. "I thought our weight people really did a good job for us. We picked up a lot of points in the weight events where I had, in my scoring, conceded."

Those weight people centered around juniors Dusty Carlson, Jeremy Robinson and Jared Vigna and senior Jim Lile, with Carlson taking first in the shot put (57-feet, 9½-inches) and Lile notching first in the javelin (210-4). Robinson added a strong second place finish in the hammer throw with a personal best throw of 198-2, while Vigna's 196-6 throw was good for second in the javelin competition.

The Ducks also got strong marks in the jumping events, as sophomore Jody Mortimore's 24-1 jump won the long jump, and sophomore Greg Bleakney came on strong in the triple jump to win with a personal best 53-1½ effort.

not being aggressive with the bat. That was a good comeback, we just needed some people to step up...earlier than the seventh inning."

Oregon State pitcher Heather Reynolds dominated the Ducks' offense by allowing only five hits and one run in her complete game victory.

"They did better at hitting their spots and keeping the ball down," said Brown. "(Reynolds) kept us more off-balance."

Both teams had six errors each in the two games and only two of the five runs Duck pitchers allowed were earned.

"When we shut the door defensively, we can play in the game," said Brown. "We can hit with anyone, but we just have to come out and play the entire game."
