Oregon drops pair of home matches

■ **TENNIS:** Washington and Washington State down the Ducks on the 15th Street Courts

Oregon's women's tennis team dropped two matches over the weekend in its first homestand since February, as Washington beat the Ducks 8-1 on Saturday and Washington State slid by Oregon 6-3 on Sunday.

The losses dropped Oregon to 12-6 on the season and gave the Ducks their fourth straight loss.

Oregon's match against the Huskies was highlighted by a trio of three-set matches as No. 1 Caryn Coyle, No. 3 Ali Napier and No. 4 Allison Sosnow all went the distance. Coyle pushed Katherine Costain to a tie break in the final set before taking the loss.

"We had a couple of close ones," head coach Wade Judy said. "The scores are a little deceiving. Allison and Ali both went three sets and when you get into three sets they can go either way. Then with Caryn's three-set match, she was playing some of her best tennis of the year. Playing No. 1 singles against Washington as a sophomore is a courageous effort. We can say that we could of and should of, but we feel good about the singles matches."

In doubles action, the Ducks

got their lone point when No. 3 Rachel Owens and Coyle beat Lindy Irving and Kari Luna.

"It is always fun to play Washington," Owens said. "They're always very competitive."

Against Washington State, Ali Napier and Shanelle Kaneshiro scored all of Oregon's three points in the loss. After losing her first set in a tie break, No. 5 Kaneshiro breezed through the final two sets 6-1, 6-2 for the three-set singles win. Napier, playing at No. 3 singles, rebounded from a loss on Saturday for a straight-set win over Narelle Hall.

"I went to the net more today," Napier said. "Yesterday [Erica Stollaff] was good from the back and today [Hall] was chipping from the back."

Following her three-set singles win Kaneshiro teamed with Napier for a three-set win at No. 1 doubles.

"We played better today," Judy said. "I think we improved from yesterday. I think our confidence was better today. Washington State is a great team, but we had our chances. It hurts to lose to the Cougars."

Oregon will continue its four-game homestand on Tuesday when it will play Eastern Washington at 3 p.m. on the 15th Street Courts. On Friday the Ducks will play their last home match of the season when Portland comes to town.

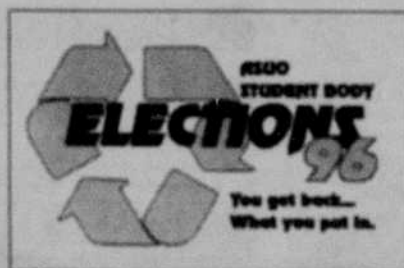
