Investigation continuing for officer in shooting

INVESTIGATION: Randy Berger was placed on a paid administrative leave after killing a suspect

The police officer who shot and killed a suspected drug dealer about a month ago said the gun fired accidentally when he was banging it against the car window, said Doug Harclerod, Lane County district attorney.

"He did not intend to fire his gun," Harclerod said.

The shooting took place March 13 at the corner of 29th Avenue and Portland Street in Eugene. Officer Randy Berger, 36, was placed on paid administrative leave after the shooting.

Investigations continue into the shooting of Marvin Young, 36, a suspected heroin dealer, without an indication of when they will wrap up.

The investigations include criminal, internal and administrative, though they will be independent of each other.

The criminal investigation is now being reviewed by prosecutors in the Benton County district attorney's office.

If Berger is found to have committed a crime, he could face serious consequences, including serving time in prison, said Brian Terrett, the public information director for Eugene public safety.

The case was handed over to Benton County so the investigation would be done as objectively as possible, Harclerod said.

"I wanted an outside, independent look from prosecutors who don't know anyone [involved in the case]," he said.

Handing cases over to other counties is not unusual, he said. There is an unwritten agreement between district attorneys' offices to give sensitive cases to

other offices. Lane County's district attorney's office has done cases for Benton County and other jurisdictions.

The internal investigation is looking into whether his actions were in violation of the policies of the Eugene police department. If he is found to have violated policies, he could face repercussions that include being fired, Terrett said.

The administrative investigation is being done by Sgt. Tim McCarthy, along with the city Risk Management office. This inquiry would probably be reflected in a policy change, if there is need for one, he said.

This will not be the first time Berger has been investigated for fatally shooting someone. In fact, he is the last Eugene officer to fatally shoot a suspect prior to last month's incident. The incident happened last August in the Fred Meyer parking lot on West 11th Avenue. Brad Alan Smith was shot after pointing a gun at the officers, Terrett said.

An investigation of the shooting by the district attorney's office found that it was justified.

In this latest case, Rapid Deployment Unit officers Larry Crompton, 32, and Berger followed a car that Young and his girlfriend were in. The car went to a restaurant parking lot at the corner of 29th Avenue and Portland Street.

Another officer, Dennis Doe, 34, was in contact with Berger and Crompton by cellular phone.

Berger and Crompton maintained surveillance of the car in the parking lot and saw Young get out and enter a car, which had just arrived in the same lot.

The two officers believed a drug deal was taking place, so they moved toward the two cars to make an arrest. Berger said it was at this point that his gun fired at Young as he banged the car window with it.

President, first lady welcome children to 117th-annual egg roll

WASHINGTON (AP) — No, the president and first lady did not dress as bunny rabbits for Monday's annual White House Easter Egg Roll.

That's what it seemed when a life-sized Easter Rabbit — accompanied by Mrs. Rabbit — walked on stage and began waving as an announcer introduced President Clinton and Hillary Rodham Clinton.

As children stared at the rabbits, trying to make sense of it all, the Clintons walked up beside the rabbits and started waving, too.

"The man wearing the Easter egg tie is going to say a few words," Mrs. Clinton said in opening the festivities, held each year on the White House's South Lawn for thousands of excited children and their equally enthusiastic parents.

Clinton, in a dark suit and a navy tie with pastel-colored eggs, noted that the day was cloud-free and sunny even though weather forecasts called for snow.

Then he blew a whistle that sent dozens of children aged 3 to 6 scurrying along their racing lanes, flicking brightly colored eggs across the grass with large spoons.

The crowd included children who are terminally ill and some who are blind, said White House spokesman Mike McCurry. The

blind children searched for eggs that beeped.

The Clintons shook hands with several families near the stage before re-entering the White House. The children cavorted in an Easter carnival, cozying up to Woodrow the White House Mouse, Statue of Liberty Barbie and the costumed Easter bunnies, M&Ms and jelly beans that roamed the grounds.

The White House used 7,000 hard-boiled eggs, dyed by the White House chef, and 27,000 wooden eggs bearing silhouettes of the White House and the Clintons' signatures.

The Easter egg roll dates back 187 years, to James Madison's presidency, when first lady Dolley Madison read that Egyptian children rolled colored eggs at the Giza Pyramids and thought Washington-area children would enjoy the activity. She established the tradition on the Capitol grounds.

In 1878, President Rutherford B. Hayes and his wife Lucy officially moved the egg roll to the White House grounds. It has been staged there annually since then except during the world wars, when it was held at the National Zoo and other locations.

Monday's event was the 117th Egg Roll at the White House.
