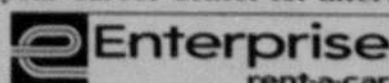

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research is used to discover how to best approach the underaged drinking on campus.

"Many of the students drinking are under 21 and that is illegal," Devine said. "The number of students doing this demands that we pay attention. The negative aspects of drinking tend to spill over into the classrooms and that affects their academics."

The University Substance Abuse Prevention Program offers an academic area of concentration, accredited by the University that requires students to earn at least 24 credits in substance abuse related classes, said Miki Mace, program coordinator for the Substance Abuse Prevention Program. Students can attend classes such as Drugs and Society, attend substance abuse prevention conferences or do service work in the community to obtain their Area of Concentration certificate, she said.

Activities such as the Oregon Ballroom Dances, which only serves soft drinks, and the annual "Funk Without Drunk" festival provide students with social activities that are free of any substance abuse.

Two residence halls, McClain and Thorton, are designated as substance-free halls. In addition, alcohol is not allowed in any of the six freshman halls on campus, according to University

Housing rules.

The ASUO initiated a designated driver shuttle to curb the safety problems connected with intoxicated drivers. The free shuttle, which runs Wednesday through Saturday from 10 p.m. until 3 a.m., provides students who have been drinking with a safe and legal alternative to driving under the influence of alcohol.

The University Greek chapters have organized a campus chapter called Greeks Advocating the Mature Management of Alcohol. GAMMA visits sororities and fraternities during Alcohol Awareness Week to promote responsible behavior concerning drugs and alcohol. They hold contests and invite speakers to talk about the risks of substance abuse.

Outreach and treatment programs through the Counseling Center offer presentations to classes, residence halls and Greek houses.

The University will continue to enhance its methods to prevent, intervene and treat drug and alcohol abuse, said Weston Morrill, dean of the Office of Student Life.

Other programs named by the Harvard reviewers were Western Washington University at Bellingham, University of Missouri at Columbia and State University of New York at New Paltz.

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dents, and their project quickly became a full time job. Most of the students they speak to are greets.

"We're not scientists," Sullivan said. "We're not people with political issues. We're two guys who have a grip on HIV. We're here to take a complex issue and make it applicable."

Their message is clear, they said: avoid high-risk activities. Both said alcohol and sex was a dangerous combination.

"The biggest lesson I've learned to date in my life is not to mix sex and alcohol," Goldman said. "If I wanted to have

sex and I had been drinking alcohol, I would find a way to rationalize it."

The duo also stressed the problem of ignorance. Too many people, including university students, have misconceptions or are not fully educated about AIDS and HIV, they said.

"We're using humor," Sullivan added. "No one wants to go after a full day of classes and listen to two guys lecture. If you put the right message into [a humorous] environment, it will have a real impact."

"AIDS is our generation's Vietnam. We have to get together and protest it."

Three daughters born on same day as mom

NAPA, Calif. (AP) — David Lammon won't soon forget his wife's and children's birthdays.

In an amazing defiance of odds, Starr Lammon gave birth to a third daughter Monday night, the same day she and both her previous daughters were born.

The odds of that are 49 million to one, Stanford math professor Gunnar Carlsson said.

Starr Lammon, 12-year-old Jeirlynn, 2-year-old Ashley and now Nicollete were all born on April 8. What's more, they were all born at the same hospital, Queen of the Valley in Napa.

The family did not plan the birth. In fact, Nicollete was born three weeks early because her mother had been in a car accident when she was six months pregnant. Starr Lammon was on

medication to stop labor when Nicollete arrived.

"She decided she wanted to be part of the crew," the 30-year-old mother said Tuesday from her hospital bed.

"This is a big surprise," she added. "None of them were induced or planned or expected or anything. It just happened."

Daughter Jeirlynn didn't mind sharing her birthday.

"I wish I had my own day but it's just really beautiful to have all three sisters have my birthday," she said.

And what are the chances of Starr having another daughter on the same day?

According to Starr and her husband, David: "Zero."
