■ The owner of Guido's asked a man to hold a suspect while he called the police. The 49-year-old man holding the suspect pulled a

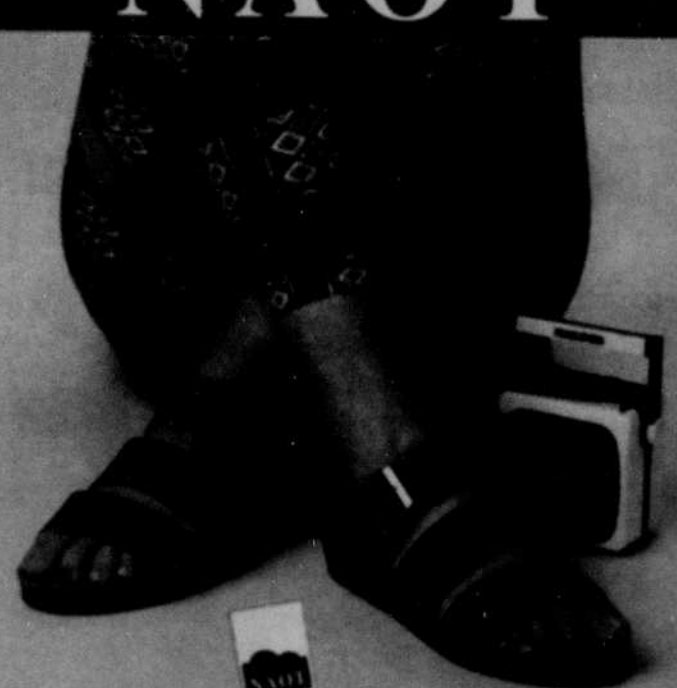
knife on the suspect. The suspect got scared, stood up and ran into a no-parking sign and received lacerations and a ping-pong-ball sized bump on his head.
