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Asian economy, politics to be subject of lectures

Three University professors are giving lectures on political and economic changes currently taking place throughout Asia. The lecture series, "Contemplating Asia," continues through May 15 on three different college campuses in Oregon.

On Tuesday, assistant professor of geography Carolyn Cartier discussed Hong Kong's integration into China, including transitions in Hong Kong's manufacturing community, the role of migrant labor and relationships across the border.

The next lectures in the series to take place at the University will be held in Room 231 Gilbert.

On May 1, history professor Glenn May will discuss the

political and social unrest in the Philippines. On May 15, Jeffrey Hanes, assistant professor of history, will talk about the future of Japan, both its problems and prospects.

"These lectures provide an opportunity for Oregonians to pause and realize how large an impact the changes in Asia will have on the world entering the twenty-first century," said Stephen Durrant, director of the University Center for Asian and Pacific Studies.

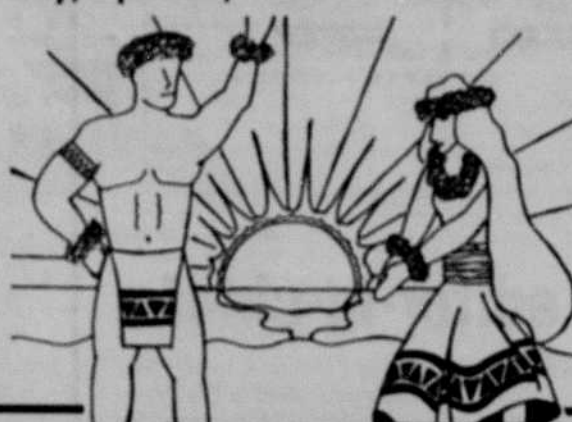
University professor speaks to City Council

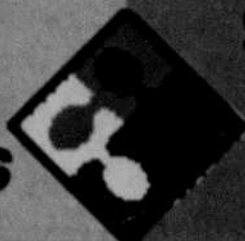
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
