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important than the others. The marchers were united by their recognition that all forms of oppression are inherently linked and inherently harmful.

Kevin Richardson, a junior at the University and who attended the march with his wife, said, "I didn't see it as an issue of women or men, but as a march for the empowerment of all races and beliefs. In that way, it was successful."

Gabrielle McEntee heard about the march through Womenspace, Eugene's domestic violence shelter, where she volunteers her time as a phone crisis worker.

"It felt good to be around a lot of like-minded people," she said. "It was wonderful how a lot of issues were addressed — women of color, lesbian/gay rights and migrant workers."

McEntee had one criticism, however. "I thought the march should have more thoroughly explored environmental issues," she said. "To me, it's just an extension of women's and minorities' oppression."

Probably the most impressive thing about the march was the fact that so many women and women's organizations, ranging from religious to civil rights groups, planned the entire event.

Bonnie Kanter, ASUO Women's Center interim director, put countless hours into planning the University's part in the march, creating a memorable experience for all who went.

To see diverse groups and thousands of women creating something that large deserves applause, no matter if you lean to the left or the right.

Shooting: Police found gun in swamp near home

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The grand jury has seven days to indict Michael Taylor with the felony charge.

On Tuesday, Eugene police found a .357-caliber Magnum handgun they believe was used in the April 3 shooting death of Ruth Taylor.

Sgt. Rick Gilliam told *The Register-Guard* that volunteers from the Lane County sheriff's search and rescue team helped find the suspected murder weapon more than 100 yards away in a brushy, swampy area.

According to search warrants and evidence reports, Eugene police also found a box of .357-caliber Magnum cartridges, an empty .357-caliber Magnum cartridge case, an orange zippered

pistol pouch and a brown holster.

Investigators also recovered a bullet in the bathtub where Ruth Taylor's body was found with a gunshot wound to her neck.

Further, in an affidavit for a search warrant, Gilliam reported that there was no sign of forced entry, and he continued that the victim had what appeared to be human hair in her right hand.

Co-workers and friends of Ruth Taylor are left with anger and questions about their friend's death. She was honored Wednesday night at a vigil in the EMU Courtyard.

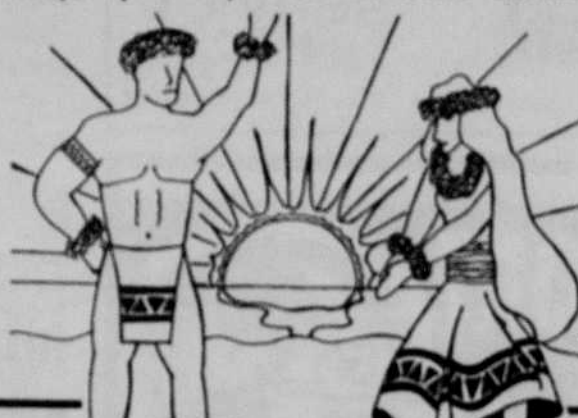
George Kissler, Ruth's supervisor for more than six years, and a representative from Womenspace spoke at the vigil.

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
