Blazers on the brink of first-round elimination

PLAYOFFS: Defense has been Portland's biggest problem against Utah

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) — After two fourth-quarter collapses, the Portland Trail Blazers are one loss away from being swept out of the playoffs for the second year in a row.

Coach P.J. Carlesimo is 0-5 in the playoffs over the past two years as the first-round series between his Blazers and the Utah Jazz shifts to the Rose Garden for Game 3 Monday night.

If this was hockey, Portland would be up 2-0. The Blazers led after three periods in both games at Salt Lake City. In Thursday's 110-92 loss and Saturday's 105-90 defeat, the Blazers were outscored 65-33 in the final period.

After the Blazers' worked out Sunday, nobody was offering any explanation for the consecutive collapses. They insist, though,

that their confidence has not been eroded.

"Not at all, not in the least," Harvey Grant said. "We've just got to work some things out in the fourth quarter. We've got to knock shots down in the fourth quarter and not let them come down and just get anything they want. They've been doing that the last two games."

Defense, Portland's strength in winning 18 of 22 games at the end of the regular season, has been a problem against Utah's patient, precise offense. The Jazz shot 59 percent from the field in their two home victories, 80 percent (12-for-15) from 3-point range.

Jeff Hornacek is 8-for-8 on 3-pointers and 16-for-22 overall.

Then there's Karl Malone, who's averaged 31.5 points per game so far. The Blazers have tried Buck Williams, Chris Dudley and Clifford Robinson against him, but no one has slowed the All-Star.
