## Because of \$150 gift, woman leaves \$2.1 million estate to WSU



**PULLMAN, Wash. (AP)** — Washington State University pharmacy student

Margaret Harrison was preparing to drop out of school for lack of funds 50 years ago. But the dean of the school gave her an unsolicited \$150, and she was able to pay her tuition.

When Margaret and her husband, Charles, died in a 1994 auto accident, she was able to repay the favor.

The Harrisons left their entire \$2.1 million estate to support scholarships at the school. The scholarships will be evenly split between the College of Pharmacy and the College of Engineering and Architecture, which Charles graduated from, a WSU official said Friday.

"They wanted to give students a chance to graduate from the university without the enormous debt that so many are taking on," said Tim O'Malley of WSU.

## President takes center stage with Whitewater testimony



**WASHINGTON (AP)** — From the confines of the White House, President Clinton

gave 4 1/2 hours of videotaped testimony Sunday as a defense witness in the criminal trial of his former Whitewater business partners.

After months of seeking to stay in the background of the Whitewater case, the president took center stage as prosecutors and defense lawyers questioned him behind closed doors throughout the afternoon.

After testifying for the defense for about an hour and a brief break, the president faced more than three hours of cross-examination by the prosecution. No details of his testimony could be learned as participants were under a court-imposed gag order.

The taped deposition has been sealed by the court pending its showing to the jury hearing the case in Little Rock, Ark.

## Gunman massacres 32 tourists before capture by police



**PORT ARTHUR, Australia (AP)** — The gunman who slaughtered 32

people at a popular tourist site and nearby pub was captured last Monday by police, after he set fire to a guest cottage where he held three hostages.

The gunman, whom police identified as a 29-year-old with a history of psychological problems, had opened fire with a semiautomatic rifle last Sunday afternoon on tourists at a colonial prison site on the island of Tasmania.

It was the worst shooting massacre in Australia this century.

"Various massacres would pale into insignificance when you look at what has happened in Tasmania," Tasmanian Police Commissioner John Johnson said.

The arrest ended a some 12-hour stand-off at the bed and breakfast, where the gunman had barricaded himself with the cottage's two owners and a guest.

## Restaurant, brewery begins renovations

After landing in Eugene just three months ago, The Wild Duck Restaurant and Brewery is already spreading its wings.

Two major additions are underway, and by mid-May the restaurant will offer an upper-level dining terrace and an enclosed beer garden.

The dining terrace will seat 70 people and have its own bar and grill.

"[It will] operate like an individual restaurant of its own," said co-owner Bob Jensen.

Jensen said he hopes the increased seating capacity will reduce the waiting time for tables on the weekends while providing comfortable outdoor dining in the downtown area.

The beer garden will increase the capacity for guests at music shows, which frequently sell out, co-owner Pat McCallum said. It will stand adjacent to the music hall. A chain-linked fence will temporarily enclose the area, but Jensen plans to create what he calls a "landscaped, garden atmosphere" for the summer.

McCallum hopes to have the beer garden completed before the Los Lobos concert on May 11 in order to make additional tickets available for the sold-out show.
