'Student Insurgent' awarded for attitude

■ **COMPETITION:** Campus publications produced by students are recognized for their creativity

Hellraising might not sound like a prestigious journalism award, but *The Student Insurgent* is proud to receive it.

The First Annual Campus Alternative Journalism Awards presented *The Student Insurgent* with first place for Hellraising and an honorable mention in opinion writing.

Staff member Chris Brady, the only graduate student on the completely student-run paper, said the Hellraising award recognizes the publication with the most provocative attitude towards journalism. And that attitude was rewarded two-fold, as the *Insurgent* won a second award in the category of Opinion Writing.

The national awards are sponsored by the Campus Alternative Journalism Project/Center for Campus Organizing, which is

based in Maryland. The competition was developed to recognize and encourage creative journalism on college campuses.

Judges for the awards included *Mother Jones* Managing Editor Patti Wolter, author and syndicated columnist Norman Solomon and *Cross Roads* magazine Editor Kim Benita Furumoto.

To enter the competition a publication must have an explicit commitment to political and economic democracy and gender equality and be anti-racism, pro-multiculturalism and pro-environment. It must also be published by students and intended for a student or youth community.

Now in its seventh year of publication, the *Student Insurgent* receives no official institutional support and is funded entirely by student money and subscriptions.

According to press materials provided by the *Insurgent*, the paper publishes a total of 15 issues during the academic year without the assistance of any faculty counselors.
