Torch lights Olympic spirit in Eugene

The 1996 Olympic Torch procession began its journey in Athens. On its way to Atlanta, it has been through the some of the greatest cities of Europe. It has crossed the ocean and will cross this continent.

On Sunday, it lit the Olympic spirit in Eugene.

"I was really glad that I got to see it," said Allison Lira, a Eugene resident. "I'll probably never get to the Olympics, so this is the one part I can participate in."

The torch, carried by Annette Peters along Agate Street, was preceded by police motorcade and Coca-Cola trucks. Peters, an American record holder in the 5,000-meter run, jogged with a partner while cheering onlookers flanked the street.

Most of the onlookers then sprinted to Hayward Field, where Peters carried the torch once around the field in honor

of Steve Prefontaine, an Oregon track and field legend. Members of the Oregon track club encircled the field, holding flags.

"It was excellent," said Tyler Childs, a Eugene resident.

Hundreds of University students and community residents lined Agate Street between 13th and 18th Avenue to see the procession come through campus.

"University of Oregon welcomes the world," read a sign hanging from the third floor of Watson Hall in Hamilton complex.

United Way volunteers dis-

tributed small American flags to waiting onlookers before the torch passed by.

"It's fun," said Peter Wright, a United Way volunteer who was passing out flags. "It's just a wonderful celebration to take part in."

Kendall Reitan, a Portland resident, said the torch's visit to Oregon was memorable.

"It was kind of exciting," Reitan said. "It's a part of history."

The torch procession will arrive in Atlanta for the 1996 Summer Olympics in July.
