For Wilcox — the youngest of the crew — the competition breeds not only improvement, but also knowledge.

"There is always going to be someone ahead of you and better than you. There is always something to strive for," Wilcox said. "When you have to go out and try and make yourself better and compete with other guys, that is what makes people better players."

"From my standpoint, I get to learn a lot from them because

they have been around, they know what it is like. There is nothing more I could ask for in terms of learning."

But after all of the dust settles, Graziani, who was 14-24 for 218 yards with four touchdown passes and a touchdown run on Saturday, is the Ducks' starting quarterback plain and simple.

"There is no [leading the players on]. You can say what you want, but I think those other two guys know who is starting — all of them know who is starting," offensive coordinator Dirk Koetter said earlier this spring. "That is not to say Tony doesn't have to earn it, doesn't have to play up to it and will never sit down. But I don't think you can [lead

the players on] and say that every position is open."

While Graziani starts, though, four others will sit on the bench. But that is a nice problem for an offensive coordinator, and for that matter, a team, to have.

"There are plenty of teams out there that when their first-string quarterback goes down, they are in big trouble. And I don't think Oregon is one of those, and that was proved last year," Koetter said.

"That is what you want," said Perry-Smith, who led the Ducks to victory against Illinois last year. "If I'm in there and it is helping us, that's good, if it's Tony then I will be there cheering him on."

On Saturday, the Ducks were also without senior right end Mark Schmidt, junior defensive backs Kenny Wheaton and Jaiya Figueras and senior cornerback LaMont Woods. But according to senior linebacker Derrick Barnes, the team has been able to overcome the absences and play together.

"We played probably the best we have all spring," Barnes said after the game. "People took their responsibilities a little better and there weren't quite as many mistakes."

After a month of spring practices concluded with a well-played spring game, the Ducks are set to come back in the fall ready to take another run at a Pacific-10 Conference Championship.

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high hurdles. In the field events, sophomore Gregg Bleakney won the triple jump by jumping farther than 50 feet in his fourth-straight meet, junior Chris Nelson won the high jump and sophomore Ryan Cole won the discus competition.

The Oregon women started out the day on Saturday winning five out of the first six events on the

track as LaReina Woods won the 100- and 200-meters, junior Nicole Commissiong captured the 400-meters, sophomore Kaarin Knudson was victorious in the 800-meters and senior Melody Fairchild recorded the fastest collegiate time in the country in the 3,000-meters.

The Ducks' fortunes took a turn for the worst later on in the meet as Oregon suffered losses in

1,500-meters, 100-meter hurdles, 400-meter hurdles and the mile relay, the last event in the meet that ultimately gave Washington the victory. Although the Ducks managed to secure wins in the 4x100-meter relay, the long jump (sophomore Jennifer Thomas — 19-0) and the javelin (sophomore Katie Pearmine — 152-0), it was not enough to surpass the Huskies.
