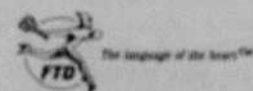

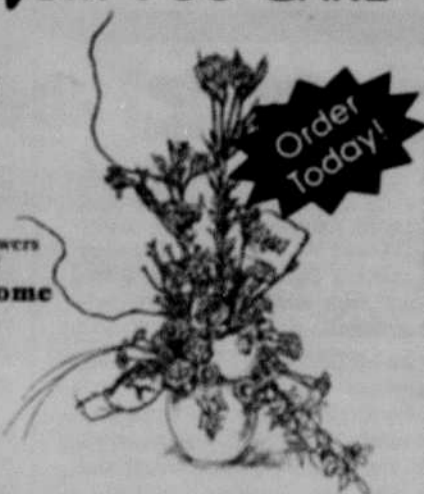

## Conference reactions to be shared

■ **FORUM:** There will be follow-up workshops for those who attended the Holocaust conference

The "Voices after the Holocaust" workshops in the EMU on Thursday and Friday following the "Ethics After the Holocaust" conference will provide a forum for people to discuss what they learned at the conference and how those lessons can be applied today.

The workshops, organized by students, are sponsored by the University Library System and the "Ethics After the Holocaust" conference organizers.

"This is in conjunction with the main Holocaust conference," said Gillian Argoff, a student who organized the workshops. "It is a real chance to unwind from the excitement of the week's conference and discuss what we have learned."

The workshops will focus on how themes from the Holocaust are still part of societal problems.

"We are focusing on how everything relates to us at a grassroots level," Argoff said.

The conference begins Thursday morning with a performance by Penelope Youngfeather, a storyteller and educator. Her performance tells the life of a 21-year-old woman who was not in the resistance movement, but who organized her own resistance in Nazi Germany, Argoff said.

"There are things still hap-

pening today that we need to be resisting and not just sitting idly by," Argoff said. "We don't have to be a part of a large organized movement. We can resist in our ways."

A panel discussion featuring a group called Amigos de los Sobrevivientes (Friends of Survivors) will focus on political prisoners and their trauma.

"There are so many things that are still going on today," Argoff said. "This discussion will give us ethical options to helping people who are survivors."

The workshops focus on prejudices against various ethnic groups throughout the world.

A video presentation and discussion will address past prejudices toward Rumanian gypsies, who were also thrown into concentration camps during the Holocaust, and the way they are treated now, Argoff said.

"Some things that happened to gypsies in the past are still going on today," Argoff said. "The point is to understand what is going on and work to change it."

A discussion on forgiveness following the Holocaust will take place Friday morning.

"There are a lot of people still trying to deal with the Holocaust," Argoff said. "Should we blame all the Germans? Should we forgive them? And most important — can we forgive them?"

The workshop is free, but participants must pay \$4 for a kosher and vegetarian dinner on Friday night. For more information, call 346-3934.
